Sealed bids for the purchase of 1953 Special Assessment Street Improvement Bonds (District No. 41) of the Township of Bloomfield, Michigan, will be received until 12:00 P.M. at the Township Hall, 4258 Telegraph Road, on the 31st day of January, 1953, until 11:00 A.M. on the 31st day of January, 1953, at which time and place said bids will be opened and read.
Said Special Assessment Bonds consist of twenty-three (23) bonds, the denomination of \$10,000.00 each, numbered consecutively from No. 1 to No. 23, both inclusive, will be dated 1/15/53 and will mature on 1/15/58.
The following are the terms of each of the bonds:
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1951;
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1952;
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1953;
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1954;
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1955;
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1956;
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1957;
\$10,000.00 February 1, 1958.
The interest on said bonds, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1952, 1953 and 1954 of said issue, may be redeemed at the option of the Township in numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after February 1, 1953, per and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption. Notice of redemption shall be given to holders of bonds to be redeemed by publication of such notice not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper of publication circulated in the State of Michigan, which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest payable on bonds so called for redemption after the date fixed for redemption, provided the Township has the money available for such redemption with the paying agent.
Said bonds shall be coupon bonds and shall bear interest from the date of issue at the rate of not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, compounded semi-annually on February 1st of each year and annually thereafter on August 1st and February 1st of each year. Interest coupons for each coupon period on any one bond shall be payable on the 1st of February and the 1st of August, and represented by one interest coupon. Both interest coupons shall be payable at a bank or trust company to be selected by the purchaser of the bonds. Accrued interest to the date of delivery of such bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at time of delivery.
Said 1953 Special Assessment Street Improvement Bonds are issued in anticipation of the collection of an equal amount of special assessments on Special Assessment Roll No. 41.
In addition to special assessments, said bonds pledge the full faith, credit and resources of the Township of Bloomfield for their payment.
Under the pledge of full faith and credit, in case of insufficiency of funds derived from special assessments to pay the principal and interest on said bonds as the same become due, the Township of Bloomfield is required to pay the amount of such deficiency out of its general funds, or if necessary, levy taxes on all taxable property within its limits within the limits of taxation provided by the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan.
For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from February 1, 1951, to their maturity, from February 1, 1951, to their maturity, and deducting therefrom any amount which the bidder who has the lowest interest cost to the purchaser of the bonds, shall be entitled to. The bidder whose bid has the lowest interest cost to the purchaser of the bonds, shall be entitled to purchase of less than all of the bonds offered or at a price less than their par value will be considered.
A certified check or cash in the amount of \$400.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank in Michigan, shall be payable to the order of the Treasurer of the Township of Bloomfield, must accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith of the bidder. The bid will be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest will be allowed on the good faith checks, and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned promptly to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.
Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Miller, Canfield, Padock and Stone, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds, which opinion will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds prior to delivery thereof. The Township shall pay the cost of printing the bonds. The bonds will be delivered at Detroit, Michigan.
