

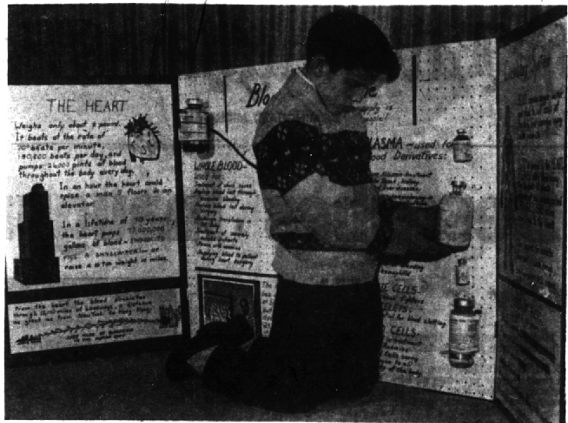

8th Grader Donates Project To Promote Blood Collection

Steven Zimmer's "Blood as Medicine" creation began as an eighth grade science project at Derby Junior High School. By Wednesday, the 13-year-old's exhibit was displayed in Shain's Drug Store window at W. Maple and Pierce streets as a promotional piece for Birmingham's second Red Cross blood collection. The collection will be held Wednesday from 2:45 to 8:45 p.m. at the Congregational Church of Birmingham at Woodward and Fernside. Steven, son of Commander and Mrs. David W. Zimmer, 2680 Middebury, Birmingham, put the finishing touches on his project after sandwiching in work periods between his studies and school swimming meets.

THE DETROIT Regional Red Cross Center supplied Steven with some of the materials and study references, and he in turn donated the completed project to the Oakland County Red Cross chapter for use in blood donor education and promotion. The exhibit illustrates whole blood and some of the many derivatives used daily in the medical profession. The project describes blood as

one of today's most amazing medicines. Blood and its derivatives save countless lives every day in civilian and military hospitals, according to Red Cross officials.

BUT, AS MRS. George A. Weinhold, Birmingham - Bloomfield donor recruitment chairman, explains, "There is only one resource for blood — people. This is why the Red Cross blood program came into being: to enable people to help each other."

Why give the blood to the Red Cross? The answer is twofold, said Mrs. Weinhold. The blood is not given to the Red Cross organization, but is given to fellow humans through the organization, acting as a distributing agent. Furthermore, the Red Cross is the only public service agency in the area which has the personnel, equipment and facilities to collect, process, store and deliver the blood which hospitals need, she said.

TO ACCOMPLISH this goal of "helping each other," nine blood collections have been scheduled for the Birmingham - Bloomfield area in 1961. Wednesday's collection will be the second of this series.

Mrs. Weinhold emphasized that donations may be credited to the Birmingham Community Blood Bank account of the Red Cross or to any group having an established account with the Red Cross.

If residents or members of their families need blood, said Mrs. Weinhold, it is available to them without charge through the Community Blood Bank and other bank accounts registered with the Red Cross. Residents not having a blood credit are asked to try and replace
