

Southfield B of E to Hold School Needs Meeting

SOUTHFIELD—The Board of Education Monday night scheduled a study meeting with the Citizens Advisory Committee and Dr. Donaid Lab of MSU, to get an area study of school needs under way. The meeting will be held Monday evening.

About 50 members of the advisory committee will do the area study under the supervision of Dr. Leonard and the association. The citizens group will be divided into four of five subcommittees to study different phases of the survey.

Areas covered will be a study of the educational community, enrollment and population forecasting, financial study, school plant survey and program planning.

State Police Dog From Southfield Begins New Job

"Jocko," the newly acquired Michigan State Police tracking dog and his handler, Trp. Richard Abbott, Erie post, scored a success in their first try as a man-dog tracking team in trailing a suspect who had been surprised in the act of stealing gas from a truck in Erie.

The suspect, Richard Berninger, 17, Erie, tracked to his home by "Jocko," 85-pound German shepherd police dog, over a circuitous five-block distance, admitted the larceny attempt to officers.

ERIE POST officers were first to arrive at the suspect's home however, having checked the registration of a car abandoned at the larceny scene. When questioned, Berninger claimed his car had been stolen. Confronted by "Jocko's" tracking ability, troopers said, the youth then confessed to the larceny attempt and admitted the stolen car report was false.

"Jocko" is the State Police department's first police dog and was received last August as a gift from the Liebestraum Kennels, Southfield. Trooper Abbott and the dog completed 14 weeks of training at the St. Louis police department's canine school early in December. The team will be transferred soon to East Lansing headquarters.

B'field, County To Match Funds For Road Work

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Bloomfield Township will match funds with the County Road Commission again this year for improvement of local major roads.

Selection of the roads were approved at Township Board meeting Monday night.

Quarton Road, from Wing Lake to Franklin, and Wattles Road, from Adams to Charing Cross, will be blacktopped. Lone Pine, from Lahar to Telegraph, will be gravelled, and Quarton Road, east of Telegraph, will be ditched and gravelled.

Eight Residents Escape from House in \$2,000 Fire

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Eight township residents escaped a \$2,000 fire Jan. 17 in their six-room home, 408 Highland. The fire was discovered by Mrs. Martha Long, 25, who saw smoke pouring upstairs into the kitchen from the basement of the two-story frame home.

She awakened Mrs. Eloise Long, 44, who was sleeping in a bedroom and alerted her two sisters, Mrs. Mary Kitts, 23, and Mrs. E. M. Shelton, 20. The four women then ushered four children in the family from one to five years old, to safety.

Firemen said an overheated coal stove furnace is believed to have caused the blaze. Pontiac firemen fought the fire for one and one-half hours.

Car Rolls Over; Driver Injured

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Henry Sternberg, 64, of Pontiac was taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital following a two-car accident Friday on Telegraph, south of Franklin Road.

He suffered internal injuries but is reported in good condition by hospital officials.

STERNBERG'S car rolled over several times into a wooded area after his vehicle struck the rear of a truck driven by Archie Matthews, 42, according to police. Matthews is also a Pontiac resident.

Matthews, who was traveling north on Telegraph, told police he felt the impact at the rear of his truck and that it caused him to forward and pick up speed. He said he then slowed down and pulled off the road, coming to a stop. He was not injured, police said.

MRS. CHARLES KELEY said single residential property was not a feasible use for the 12 Mile sites.

"No developer would invest there for that purpose," she said. "The property is only suitable for small 10,000 homes, which are not allowed in Lathrup. We envision extensive multiple dwellings there which would end the uncertainty as to eventual use of the land and add to property values."

Zoning Board chairman Vernon Peel said the board's report represented a compromise between opposition of property owners and a practical approach to use of the 12 Mile Road land.

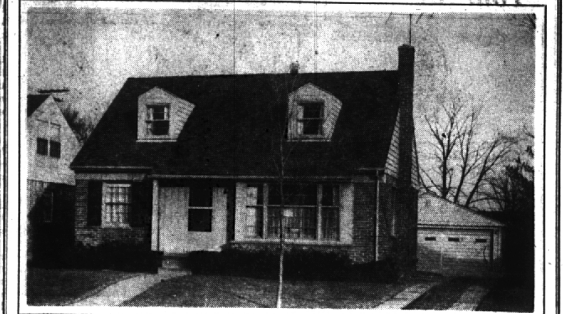
Lathrup's Attorney Acts as Prosecutor

Police Chief Thomas Telefsen said the police, until now, have had legal advisor in justice court.

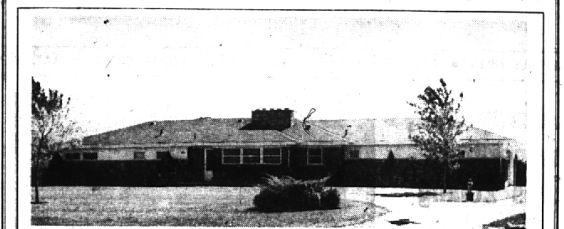
