Bois Blanc Island Is Archers' Dream Spot

One of the most distinctive and least written-about areas of Northern Michigan is Bois Blanc Island. In spite of this lack of fame—or perhaps because of it—the island is an archer's paradise, according to Glenn P. Bruneau, supervisor of The University of Michigan's Wood Technology Laboratory and a veteran bow-and-arrow hunter.

"THE HUNTER WITH a high-powered rifle can shoot a deer at 300 yards," Bruneau explains. "But a bowman needs to bring the deer up to 30 yards or so. Instead of crowds and no trespassing signs, he requires quiet and no interruptions."

"BOIS BLANC is a fresh fruit and vegetable base during the Indian wars," Bruneau recalls. "But every shack today there is an orchard still growing, or a cluster of fruit trees."

Located about seven miles off mainland Michigan in a string that includes Mackinac and Round Islands, Bois Blanc is a large island (15 miles long and five miles wide) that lives up to its name—in French it means White Woods.

"ALTHOUGH IT HAS only a thin soil over crushed limestone base, the island has the most beautiful stands of beech and white birch I have ever seen," says the U of M wood specialist. "I have seen white birch almost three feet in diameter, and find birch white pines in typical virgin clumps."

"There is a lovely spot on the island, surrounded by virgin pines, that was formerly an Indian ceremonial site," he adds. "Indian relics are found there occasionally." The University of Michigan has sent archeological teams to Bois Blanc to obtain prehistoric Indian relics dating back from about 1100 A.D.

ROADS ARE LIMITED, but visitors may take an automobile to the island on the launch operated by Ray Plaunt of Cheboygan, or they may rent a vintage auto on the island. Bruneau says "the island must have one of the world's largest collections of old cars." There is also a small airport.

Fishing is good, and there is a good population of deer, rabbit, grouse, raccoon and even some muskassauga rattlesnakes. Wild ducks and geese are plentiful in season.

Information concerning accommodations may be obtained from the Islander, Pines Hotel, Pointe Aux Pins, Bois Blanc Island. Pilots who fly over the hotel are picked up by car at the airport.

Answers 'Commercial' Charges In Civil War Centennial Plans

Charges frequently made or implied that the Civil War Centennial is becoming too commercial have brought a response from Major General U. S. Grant, III, chairman of the National Commission established by Act of Congress to plan and coordinate it.

While admitting that there may be more souvenir items than normal, he pointed out that the agency has heads with no control over such matters and that it has concentrated on using its influence to keep commercialization of the commemoration period at a minimum.

He also reminded that many of the souvenir items now on the market and blamed on the advent of the Centennial have been available for many years, but in view of the occasion, special attention has been drawn to them.

"WHILE THE SALE of such articles does carry an unfortunate commercial flavor," he said, "it must be remembered that it also carries the remembrance of the Civil War story to a very wide public and especially to the young citizens of tomorrow upon whose wise patriotism our country must depend in the future. They draw inspiration from what they learn of the great deeds of Americans a hundred years ago."

The Centennial Commission, he added, has never participated in any commercial effort, nor has it shared in any profit from such an undertaking.

"WE HAVE AIDED the 45 state Centennial commissions by giving them information as to where they can secure flags, uniforms, and arms," he said, "but beyond that we have no interest whatsoever in encouraging the sale and distribution of any type of equipment or souvenir."

"This is strictly a service to aid commissions that are planning commemorative ceremonies and that are in great need of authentic items with which to stage such events."

REALIZING THAT THE commission had no authority under the law by which it was created to restrain or control commercialization under the American free enterprise system, he reports the agency has directed its efforts toward keeping the business end of the Centennial on as conservative a scale as possible.

One step toward this end was the preparation of a booklet en-

more so than radio and television programs on Civil War subjects which are sponsored by commercial interests.

"The Commission derives no remuneration whatsoever from them. We do, however, recognize their value in educating the many people whom they reach in the history of the Civil War, thereby constituting a voluntary and worthwhile means of 'preserving and writing the history of the Civil War,' contemplated by the law creating the Commission."

"WE DO NOT CONSIDER that advertisements, devoid of sales talk for the products of the sponsor and dealing with Civil War subjects," General Grant said, "are a commercialization of the Centennial. Certainly they are not."
