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## SMASH CRASH BANG

By the time you read this, these stalwarts should be started on our remodeling program which we hope will enable us to serve you better and make your shopping more pleasant and exciting. We're sure that you'll bear with us during any temporary inconvenience that may result. We should be all squared away in a few weeks including a new face and a new hat.

Well, has your lawn burned out (like ours is beginning to) from lack of rainfall? Let's both start following the good advice we've been repeating for the past couple of weeks. WATER INFREQUENTLY AND DEEP. About once a week should be often enough. Put on at least one inch of water each time and in such areas that you run the sprinkler. Check your mower to be sure that you are leaving the grass blades two inches tall after cutting.

### JULY NOTES

This is the month for transplanting iris. Divide, taking newer growth from the outside. Set roots two inches deep. Glads should be well watered when they are coming into bud. On hot days they respond well to a fine mist from the hose nozzle.

Hardy mums will be bushier if you pinch back the early buds, and they'll be bloomer if fed now with regular garden fertilizer. Rose beds should be soaked deeply once a week. Remove seed pods from peonies and feed with garden fertilizer. This will help develop good strong eyes for next season.

Red spider mites can cause damage to evergreens this month. You can check yours by shaking a branch over a piece of white paper. If you have them, you'll see tiny red specks. They may be sprayed with a good miticide, or a good heavy blast with the hose once a week will wash most of them off.

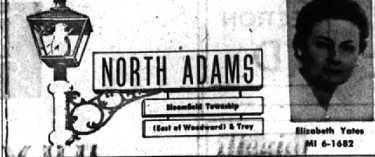
