ORDINANCE NO. 871  
AMENDMENT TO PROBLEMS AND CANVASSERS ORDINANCE AND CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND EXISTING ORDINANCES RELATIVE TO ALL CHARITABLE AND PHILANTHROPIC ACTIVITIES.  
THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDINANCE NUMBER 871 of the City of Birmingham, entitled Peddler and Canvasser Ordinance, is amended by adding a new subsection thereto as follows:  
Section 2 (c) No charitable, religious, eleemosynary, or philanthropic activities shall be subject to regulation under this ordinance, any provision to the contrary contained herein notwithstanding.  
Ordained this 3rd day of July, 1961, by the Mayor of the City of Birmingham to be effective upon publication.
