

# Proper Maneuvers Can Prevent Auto Accidents

What would you do if your car went into a sudden skid? ... if it ran off the roadway ... if a tire blew out?

The Traffic Safety Association recommends that drivers follow the advice of Amos E. Neyhart, director of the Institute of Public Safety, Pennsylvania State University and one of the outstanding driver education authorities in the nation.

He has listed the following five common driving situations and outlined the maneuvers to handle these situations safely:

- 1. MERGING WITH traffic on freeways.** Drive in the accelerating lane at a speed that will permit blending with traffic and not cause the freeway traffic to slow down or stop. In other words, enter where there is a gap opening and don't "horn in" ahead of fast moving traffic.
- 2. Passing a slower moving vehicle.** Stay far enough back of the driver you are passing to check traffic to the rear, the side and ahead. If conditions are favorable,

roads are most likely to be slippery at the beginning of a rain.

5. Driving off pavement edge onto shoulders. If the right wheel gets off the paved surface, don't try to get back onto the pavement at a high speed. Avoid getting nearly "icky." Never slam on the brakes. Drive straight ahead with the right wheel off the pavement, and slow your car gradually. Drive at a slow speed, with the right wheels
