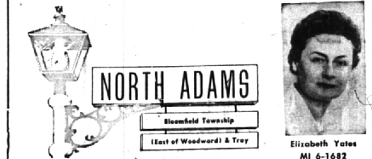
Members of the Bloomfield Farms branch, WNRGA are engaged in horticultural therapy work at Pontiac State Hospital.
