

Fire Business Topic of Board In West B'field

WEST BLOOMFIELD—Township fire department business was of primary interest at a meeting of West Bloomfield Township's board last week.

The board renewed its contract to furnish fire protection for the city of Keosauqua Harbor.

A \$6,000 rate, with an additional charge of \$75 a run after the first five, is the same as last year.

PLACEMENT of an additional siren with a monitor for tripping the alarm at Walnut Lake fire station was discussed at length by the board.

A letter from township resident M. R. Sutton complaining of failure of the present siren to go off at a recent fire in the vicinity of the station was read.
