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# Wood Creek Farms Adopts Road Budget

WOOD CREEK FARMS—Meeting Tuesday at the St. Vincent-Sarah Fisher home, the Wood Creek council adopted a \$7,300 road budget and formulated a Civic Improvement Committee, topping \$7,300 for the payment of the only outstanding bill of the month.

The chairman, Jack Richards was authorized to purchase several sewer rods for his department which are available for residents to borrow when their driveway culverts become clogged.

The road budget provides \$1,700 for dust-control; \$1,000 for grading; \$500 for snow removal; \$2,000 for surfacing; \$800 for culverts; \$1,000 for ditching and \$800 for miscellaneous.

SOUTHFIELD High School varsity band members will be led by five majorettes this fall, three of them for the second year.

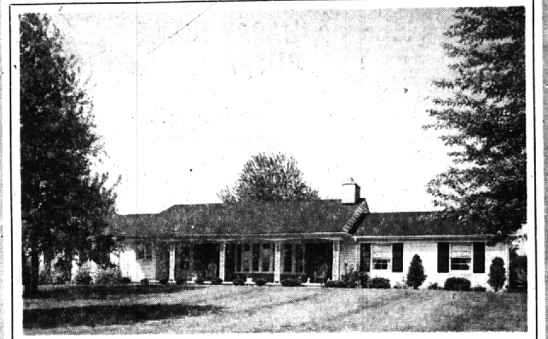
They are seniors Mary Bray, Lois Gorman and Shari Norbury, as well as Christine Lakota, a junior, and Michelle Mandell, a sophomore.

Mary and Lois also were awarded first and second place for leadership, cooperation, spirit and fitness. Mary was presented with a trophy, Lois with a baton.

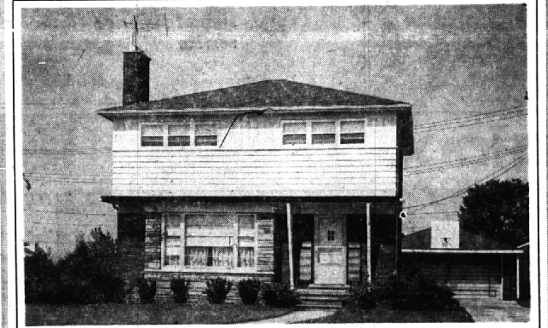
Kathie Flower, a senior and a varsity cheerleader, also attended the camp.

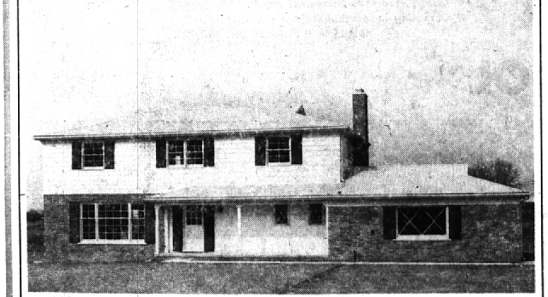
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# Franklin Appoints 3 New Planners

FRANKLIN—Unable to complete its agenda, the Franklin council did, however, cover a lot of ground Monday appointing new planning commission members, reviewing plat plans and sketches for the new village offices, drainage and dumping problems and the high cost of defending the rigid zoning restrictions.

Don Hacker of Colony Hill, Kenneth Bailey of S. Greenbriar and David Goodnough of Rosemond Court were appointed to fill planning commission vacancies left by Walter Dryer, Frederick Gebb and Fred Worden. The latter have all served as chairman of the group during their tenure. The new appointees will serve three-year terms.

"Our planning group now has members representing every section of the village," president Calvert Thomas declared. "This should be beneficial to the council towards developing future action."

Edward Casenhiser of Whately Road was appointed to work with Bernard Ziesow on the audit committee. Ziesow will again act as chairman.

DUMPING At the southeast corner of the Kahn property was brought to the attention of the council. Street enforcement of pertinent ordinances was agreed upon.

Dumping in other areas also appear to be on the increase, so it is expected the council will adopt a "get tough" policy with assistance from the village marshal.

ROAD ADVISORY committee chairman Stan Hunter admonished the council for failing to follow through with proper authorities in correcting the drainage conditions near Wellington and Fairgrove. He urged that representatives of the county drain commission, the Franklin Hills Country Club and adjoining residents should be included in discussions.

"They are more than willing to cooperate, but have to be told that conditions are not corrected," Hunter said.

FRANKLIN ROADS are scheduled for a grading and dust-control treatment next week, street commissioner Norman Naimark advised the council. Use of sulphide was discussed. Areas interested in setting up a special assessment district can obtain proper petition forms from their representatives.

Plat plans for the new South Meadow subdivision at 13 Mile and Franklin road, an area of 20 acres, was presented by Frank Giffels for the Austin Building Company. Left for further study, the plans propose approximately 20 lots of various sizes as a part of the McKinley farm.

ASSessor ALFRED Emmerling presented tentative architectural plans to the "regulator" of the real estate office on the village green which will soon be expanded library facilities and village offices. Hampered by vacations and failure to get all members of the library group together, the village committee, together for finalizing, the matter was tabled until July 24 when the council convenes again.

VILLAGE MARSHAL John Donaldson reported that steps had been taken to get opinions and suggestions from state and county traffic authorities regarding the hazardous curve on Franklin Road, grimly called Dead Man's Curve.

Donaldson said there have been seven serious accidents in that vicinity in two months. Efforts to have the curve altered however will have to be instigated by county officials, he said.
