

First Week of Program Draws Record Turnout

A record 5,000 boys and girls turned out for the first week of the Southfield Parks and Recreation Department's summer recreation program, reports Peter J. Cristiano, superintendent.

A total of 1,000 boys and girls registered at the various playgrounds. A record 500 children registered at East Southfield.

Over 400 boys and girls participated in the city-wide checker tournament, held at nine playgrounds. Forty boys and girls competed in the finals held at Magnolia school Friday.

In overall team points for the checker tournaments, John Grace playground finished with a total of 30 points, ahead of Magnolia's 17 points and McKinley's 11 points.
