

High Rise Apts. Delayed For CBD Plan

Action on a request concerning high rise apartments in Birmingham has been under consideration by the planning board for several months, continues to be delayed.

The board received Birmingham builder George Glover's request for the City's thinking on a 10- or 12-story apartment building in November, but wants to wait for completion of the central business district development plan.

The board recently received the completed CBD plan and discussed it for the first time on Tuesday night's meeting.

PLANNING BOARD Chairman Eliot Robinson said similar discussions of the plan will continue for the next several meetings. Reactions of the board will then be forwarded to the city commission.

"The planning board feels it can make no recommendations on the merits or location of high rise apartments until it has more thoroughly acquainted itself with the recommendations of the CBD plan and proposed plan," said Robinson. Robinson said although the CBD plan refers to the possibility of high rise apartments in the residential areas of the southwest quadrant, the board hasn't arrived at any conclusion as to its merits.

"The possibility is there, he said, but it must be explored through detailed study of the plan.

IN OTHER board business, a recommendation denying Hubert G. Smith's zone change request for the intersection of Hazel and Adams roads) from R-3 single family residential to R-1 non-residential business classification was forwarded to the city commission.

The denial was made on the grounds that encroachment of business zoning in this particular residential area is unwarranted, said Robinson.

A FLOOD plain zoning request from the city of Farmington was tabled pending professional assistance in resolving the matter. Robinson and Walter Denison were re-elected chairman and vice chairman of the planning board. Robinson's election marks the first time a chairman has been re-elected in several years.

The board discussed the selection of a new city planner and decided to set up interviews for applicants within the next 10 days.
