\$10,000 UF Grant Goes to Camp Oakland

The United Foundation of Detroit has granted financial assistance of \$10,000 to Camp Oakland, it was announced today by Walter Gehrke, president of the Oxford camp for underprivileged children, route, of 29 Oakland Park, Pleasant Ridge, said the grant would meet approximately half of the \$20,000 cost of providing summer camping to over 400 boys and girls from the area served by the UF.

Under the grant, Camp Oakland will discontinue soliciting funds from private donors in the area served by Detroit's United Foundation.

THE CAMP HAS not previously received UF assistance. Summer camp costs have been met through contributions from Oakland County service clubs, as well as private donors.

"The camp will continue to receive support from the many service clubs which have taken a great interest in it, both financially and otherwise," said Gehrke.

Children who could not otherwise attend summer camp spend two weeks with all expenses provided at Camp Oakland. The children receive clothing and medical care when necessary.

Dr. Kingsley Montgomery, educational coordinator for the Juvenile Division of Oakland County Probate Court, directs the summer camp, located on a private lake on a 330-acre farm near Oxford.

COUNSELORS are college students or teachers, who receive academic credits besides modest compensation.

James A. Aliber, of 678 Henley, Birmingham, is treasurer of the camp's board of directors, on which 23 other Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills residents are currently serving.

Since it began his activities with only a farm house in 1953, Camp Oakland each year has added new cabins and other buildings and increased the number of children accommodated.

Besides the summer camping program, Camp Oakland provides a home at its Girls' Ranch and Boys' Ranch for children who are permanent wards of Oakland County Probate Court. The camp also operates a work education program for teenage boys who are school "drop-outs."
