



Family Picnic to End Day Camp at Franklin

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New Offices, Roads Discussed in Franklin

FRANKLIN—Meeting Monday night to clean up scraps of the monthly agenda, Franklin councilmen discussed plans for the remodeling of their future offices and enlarged library—but set them

aside, again, for more precise specifications and consultation with councilman Edward Green, absent from recent meetings.

COUNCILMEN William Kahn and Eugene Kelly were put in charge of circulating a petition for the creation of a special assessment district for the blacktopping of perimeter roads surrounding the village green. Adjacent property owners, including the Franklin Community Church, will be approached to join in the venture.

Kelly was also instructed to send a letter to residents spelling out their responsibilities under Ordinance No. 8 regarding curb requirements.

A clarification of qualifications seemed necessary when Kelly mentioned the advisory committee urged enforcement of the rule stipulating "a culvert under every driveway."

His colleagues questioned whether this meant "every" existing driveway, regardless of location and general drainage conditions.

THE MUCH MULLED proposed Ordinance No. 16, drawn up to condense and modify existing zoning construction codes, was again revised and will be presented for council action in August.

Councilman Robert Winkel reported that all-blighted elms on village property would be removed by next week, except for a large one which will be sprayed for removal in the fall, after a heavy frost.

Copies of amended regulations for plating procedure were distributed for council study by the August meeting. These were originally adopted in October of 1954.

Before adjourning, the council agreed to take the position that old real estate signs on village right-of-way, regardless of their non-conforming use, were in violation and should be handled accordingly.

To Get Resuscitator—LATHRUP—The purchase of a resuscitator for police department use was approved Monday night by the council. Cost of the equipment is \$255.

Bingham Takes Action On Charter Amendment

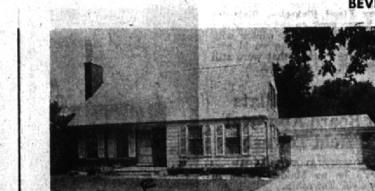

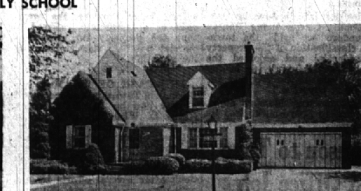
