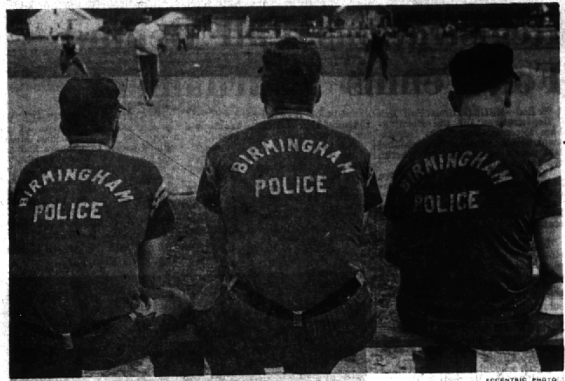
Bill Restrick's smashing 80 was good for third place.

The team, in its third year, has regularly scheduled games with eight other police department teams in the area.

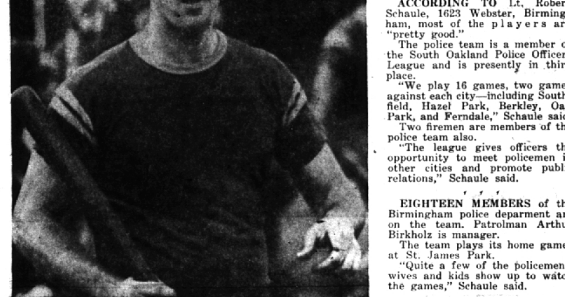
According to Lt. Robert Schaule, 1625 Webster, Birmingham, most of the players are "pretty good."

"Quite a few of the policemen's wives and kids show up to watch the games," Schaule said.

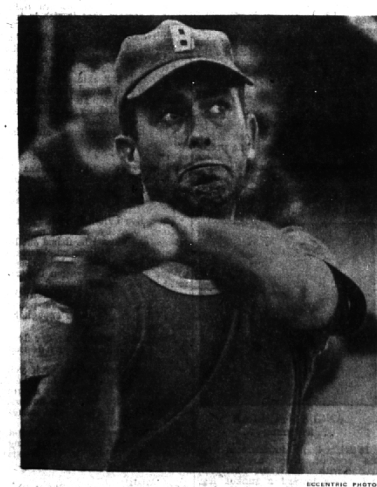
"We don't have any real stars that might give competition to the major league," he said, "because anyone can hit the blooper ball pitching. We just have a lot of fun."
