Property Owners Object
To Redding Road Sewer

Memo to Birmingham City Commissioners: William J. Ingram, Robert Page and William E. Roberts:

You had you had to miss Monday night's commission meeting, especially the public hearing on necessity for a proposed Redding Road sewer.

It was one of those rip-roaring affairs.

You know, the kind where someone in the audience gets up and points the finger of accusation at the commission. Fortunately, it's the kind that doesn't happen often in Birmingham.

If you had been there, fellows, you would have seen calm, charming and unflinching Mayor Florence H. Willett deal firmly, determinedly with this group.

times and that there would be no benefit to them.

Bumpus opined that the hearing was "ill-advised" and suggested tabling it for six months.

Later, however, he pressed for a decision "tonight."

YOU TOO, probably would have become irritated at G. L. Derr's frequently interrupting discussion to rise to a "point of order." He resides at 2910 Redding.

The mayor was forced at one point to ask for harmony.

The scene was reminiscent of the Army-McCarthy hearings a few years ago, with Derr speaking of "due process of law" and questioning the constitutionality of the proceedings.

He wanted the record "to so show" that the entire hearing was being tape-recorded. (The commission has been tape recording its meetings for almost a year now.)

Eight property owners are involved in the special assessment district extending along Redding from Chesterfield west about 1,350 feet (in the Quanton Heath Subdivision).

ONE OF the property owners, J. Allen Bumpus, 1950 Redding, insisted that the only reason the hearing was called was because he had requested in April refund of a \$500 bond deposit made five years ago.

Commissioner Carl F. Ingram agreed that that was what triggered the hearing but said it was "immaterial."

"The only point to decide here tonight," he said, "is whether this sewer is necessary."

Then he added that the refund "doesn't make it necessary."

Ingram said, "There is no mystery why this was brought before us."

"Before refunding the bonds, the engineering department and the city manager rightly examined the drainage situation there to see if there was necessity for a sewer."

CITY MANAGER L. R. Gare outlined the need for a sewer to be built on May 5. Gare said then that its construction had not been possible until completion of a relief sewer on Baynale and Pine.

City Engineer William Killen explained that sewers in that area now used by the eight properties are deficient from a design standpoint.

He pointed out that since construction of the laymain sewer there has been no flooding in that area, but insisted that it would be possible with a heavy rainfall.

The property owners strongly disagreed.

ONE OF them, John Dreystadt, 2120 Redding, submitted a petition to the commission, signed by all eight owners, opposing the sewer on the grounds that need had not been established, that there were no detailed plans on costs and es-

imates and that there would be no benefit to them.
