BITS OF BIRMINGHAM

One of Birmingham's well-known residents—now living in Bradenton, Fla.—has been in town for a couple of weeks visiting old friends and relatives. He's retired Birmingham Police Lt. Henry Timm, who keeps some of his leisure time occupied by running his sporting goods store in Bradenton. "I see a number of Birmingham people regularly as they vacation in or near my new home," Timm told this Wanderer Friday. "And several ex-Birmingham couples have retired there, too." One of the most unusually rare source origins for a man's name is exemplified in the person of Dilvie D. Langlois, D.D.S., of 2847 Trafford.
