

Panel to Discuss Trade Policies

Members of the Birmingham League of Women Voters will preview some of the questions they will discuss next fall in their consideration of United States tariff and trade policies by tuning in to Channel 4 on Saturday evening from 9:30 to 10:30.

Charles Percy, chairman of the board of the Bell and Howell Company, and Jackson Spears, vice president of Burlington Mills, will debate the question, "How the United States Need a More Restrictive Trade Policy?"

Among the subjects expected to be covered in the debate are the recent problem of U. S. dollar outflow and imbalance of payments; domestic unemployment and its relationship to foreign trade; possible adjustments for injured industries and the foreign policy implications of restrictive trade measures.

Con-Con Delegates Start Campaign

Battle lines are being drawn today for the campaign for Constitutional Convention delegate posts.

Several Birmingham-Bloomfield area residents filed nominating petitions in Oakland Circuit Court before Tuesday's deadline.

Party primary elections July 25 will narrow the field. Then on Sept. 12 voters will go to the polls to elect one delegate for each legislative district.

The 144 delegates will meet Oct. 8 in Lansing to consider changes in the state's constitution.

The job of delegate will pay \$1,000 per month up to 1 1/2 months.

In the third representative district six Republicans and one Democrat have filed.

Republicans are: Mrs. Jean Ketchum, Birmingham, past state president of the League of Women Voters and a member of the CPM executive committee; Henry A. Woolfenden, city commissioner and former mayor of Bloomfield Hills; Stanley J. Fiol, Birmingham, an engineer with a Detroit valve company, who has been active in Cub Scout work, Little League, Baldwin Kenneth A. Whitmer, West Bloomfield Township, an educator; Marjorie Hazel Kabis, Birmingham, and Richard H. McManus, West Bloomfield Township.

The Democrat is Arthur N. Titchin, West Bloomfield Township, an attorney and real estate developer.

FILING AS A Republican for the 12th senatorial district was George C. Romney, Bloomfield Hills, state chairman of Citizens for Michigan, president of American Motors Corp. and long the leading proponent for a Constitutional Convention.

Opposing him will be William A. O'Brien, Jr., a Clawson councilman. Filing with Romney in Pontiac last Thursday were Arthur G. Elliott, Jr., Pleasant Ridge, county Republican chairman for the district, and Richard C. Van Dusen, Bingham Farms, for fourth district.

The only other Republican filing for the fourth district is J. William Roberts, Southfield.

NINE DEMOCRATS filed for that district, however. They are: Joseph S. Asherson, Oak Park; Judson C. Goltz, Farmington; Ashley Gorman, Southfield; David Kauffman, Southfield; Thomas Kavanaugh, Beverly Hills; Leo T. Menzinger, Farmington; Brian K. Milington, Berkeley; Harold M. Pringle, Oak Park; and Jose Santiago, Berkeley.

The 12th district comprises Oakland County. Included in the third district are Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, and the townships of Avon, Bloomfield, West Bloomfield, Commerce and Milford; fourth, Southfield, Farmington, Oak Park and the southwestern portion of the county; fifth, Royal Oak, Clawson, Huntington Woods and Pleasant Ridge.

COUNTY REPUBLICAN headquarters in Birmingham announced today that Romney and other Republican hopefuls will present their views at a "meet-the-candidates" rally at 8 p.m. Wednesday at Birmingham Community House, 880 S. Bates.

Each candidate will give a brief presentation of his views on constitutional revision, then answer questions from the floor.

Supervising arrangements is Mrs. Allen Strom, 1130 Wakefield, Birmingham.

Mrs. Ketchum's campaign co-chairmen, T. Hollister Mahley and Mrs. John D. Rumsey, called a meeting for next week of the Reformulate Plans for the June and July campaign.

IN ANNOUNCING his candidacy, Whitmer said he is "in favor of more authority for local governments to handle their own problems and of redistribution of the House of Representatives so we in this district will get our proper share of representation."

Whitmer attended Birmingham High School, received a B.A. degree from Michigan State University in political science, taught school for five years in Farmington and Goshen.

Fiol, a resident of Birmingham for 25 years, was educated at St. Mary's Redford and Lawrence Tech. He is a former employee of The Birmingham Eccentric.

Fiol said he believes "in government for the people without overlapping agencies."

HE PLEDGED "to work cooperatively with 143 other representatives to this end."

He favors restricting Kavanagh is an attorney with offices in Birmingham. He was graduated from University of Detroit High School and received his bachelor's degree (cum laude) in philosophy from Notre Dame.

He has served as chairman of Birmingham Democratic Club and as a member of the State Democratic Central Committee.
