**Noted Harpist Feted At Musical Program**

Mrs. H. Simms Ruhl of Baldwin Court entertained a group of musical people of the area in honor of the noted harpist Aristid von Wurtzler of New York who spent the holiday in Detroit.

Von Wurtzler has earned his Doctorate in music since coming to the country in 1956 at which time he was selected by Paul Farry for solo appearance with the Detroit Symphony.

IN 1958 HE WAS chosen by Leonard Bernstein to be harpist of the New York Philharmonic. In April of this year he made his New York debut as a Concert Harpist at Town Hall.

In October the artist will return to Detroit for concert appearances at Wayne State University before leaving for a tour of European music centers climaxed by the Salzburg Festival.

Also next season in New York he will premiere and record the Concerto for Harp and Orchestra composed and dedicated to him by the late Ernst Von Dohnanyi.
