HERE ARE THE RULES:

1. Entrants must:
 - a. Be regularly enrolled high school students (with grade and school) as of June 1, 1961, in the Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, West Bloomfield and Southfield public schools, Cranbrook School for Boys, Kingswood School for Girls, Detroit Country Day School, Martin High School, Rice, Dearborn School and Bloomfield Country Day School.
 - b. Have written permission from a parent or guardian to participate in the contest and accept any award.
2. The contest starts at 8 a.m. Monday, June 19, and ends at 6 p.m. Saturday, July 29, 1961.
3. Only new subscriptions will earn points toward an award: New subscriptions are defined as those obtained for individuals who have not been subscribers before the contest begins on May 1, 1961, and for periods of 6 months, one year, two years, three years, four years and five years.
4. Contest points will be awarded on the following basis:
 - a. 10 points for each new one-year subscription
 - b. 5 points for each additional year up to and including five years
 - c. 10 points for each new 9-month college subscription
 - d. 5 points for each new 6-month subscription
5. The boy and girl who earns the highest number of points during the contest shall be the winners. In the event these winners are not graduating high school seniors, the scholarship fund will be placed in escrow until his or her graduation. If a winner does not continue on to college, he or she will be awarded \$100 to apply towards a wardrobe, materials, tools, etc., for his or her business or craft career.
6. A 7-day educational trip to Bermuda will be awarded the next five highest contestants—whether boys or girls—who accumulate the greatest number of points over 500. Bermuda winners must elect by July 1, 1961, to accept the award. The Eccentric will pay for the round trip plane fare, hotel accommodations and a title to Bermuda.

7. All other contestants will receive cash awards equal to 10 cents for each point over 500. The amount of cash awarded in this manner will be determined by a special cutoff for the greatest number of additional new subscriptions following simultaneous notification of tying contestants, the cutoff period to end at 6 p.m. Monday, July 31. Winners names will be published in the Aug. 7 issue of The Eccentric. The decision of the judges shall be final.
8. The awards are non-transferable.
9. Contestants must submit at least 30 points each and every week to remain eligible.
10. In the event of a tie for any or all of the seven top awards, the winner(s) in the category of the tie will be determined by a special cutoff for the greatest number of individual new subscriptions. If this still results in a tie, the winner(s) will be determined by a special cutoff for the greatest number of additional new subscriptions following simultaneous notification of tying contestants, the cutoff period to end at 6 p.m. Monday, July 31. Winners names will be published in the Aug. 7 issue of The Eccentric. The decision of the judges shall be final.
11. The scholarship winners may elect to take a \$200 college scholarship plus a title to Bermuda.
12. Contestants must attend informational meetings each Friday afternoon.
13. A properly qualified adult chaperone from The Eccentric will accompany the Bermuda trip winners. The trip will be made the week of August 14, 1961.
14. The Eccentric reserves the right to cancel the contest if, in its opinion, the contest is not warranted by the number of contestants competing.

15. Points will be awarded only for those new subscriptions which are paid for by 1 o'clock noon July 29, 1961.
