

Recreation Round-Up

SWIMMING CLASSES

Registration is being taken this week for the recreation board's summer swimming classes. Those interested should report to Eton Park shelter building on Lincoln and Eton, 1 to 6 p.m. on weekdays. ADDITIONAL SPORTS Playoff Possible After Regulation Open Play

There's at least one chance in three that a playoff will be needed to settle the 1961 U. S. Open golf championship after the field has gone the regulation 72 holes at Oakland Hills Country Club, June 15-17.

There have been 20 playoffs in the 60 previous Opens. It already has been four years since Dick Mayer won the last one by seven strokes at Inverness Club of Toledo, O.

Add the fact that three previous Opens have been decided at Oakland Hills without a playoff and it would appear the tournament is overdue to have an extra-round decision.

MUCH TO THE relief of the older players—and many of the younger—the United States Golf Association no longer requires those tied for first place to go at least 36 holes for a decision.

Back in 1951, Billy Burke and George Von Elm went a record 144 holes in the Open 72-hole tournament they played another 72 holes before Burke emerged as the winner by a stroke at Inverness, 148 to 149. Five days of 95-degree heat helped make it the most exhausting play-

off in U. S. golf history.

Today's players who tie for first place over the 72-hole route go on to settle the dispute in an 18-hole round or at many rounds, depending on necessity. Several of them have gone 36 holes.

THERE HAVE BEEN six three-man playoffs and 14 two-man playoffs in the 60 previous Opens. Some of the most famous names in golf, Willie Anderson and Bob Jones, who share with Ben Hogan the distinction of having won four Opens, each won twice in playoffs.

Jones also lost twice.

The most one-sided playoff was that in which Jones won by 23 strokes from Al Espinosa over 36 holes at Winged Foot in 1929.

One of the most storied playoffs was that of Gene Sarazen's victory in 1935 at Merion Golf Club, Ardmore, Pa., in which Ben Hogan won with 69 over Lloyd Mangrum's 73 and George Fazio's 75.

THE SCORES don't tell the story of Mangrum's heart-breaking tie for first place with Hogan by a single stroke when he unthinkingly picked up his ball on the 16th green to blow off an insect before trying a 12-foot putt. That cost him a two-stroke penalty and his chance to overtake Hogan.

Oakland Hills could see another of these extra round showdowns this season. But it won't need a playoff to provide the most stirring action. Arnold Palmer defending the championship he won so dramatically last year at Cherry Hills.

If one were making a future book on Palmer's possible challengers, it would be a long list. In 1959, he was runner-up to Tommy Horton, winner two years ago; Gene Littler; Tommy Bolt; Doug Ford; Lloyd Swain and those two great veterans—Ben Hogan and Sam Snead would all have supporters.

There are so many great golfers today that any number can be considered a chance to take it all at Oakland Hills.

do before was 15th.

The tourney came back twice in 1937 and 1951. Ralph Guldahl won in '37 when he set a record 72-hole score of 281. Guldahl, who retired after saying that there are no more worlds to conquer, edged by two strokes an unknown newcomer to the professional circuit, Sam Snead.

And the Open last year, it was a close chase.

TRY AS HE may, Mr. Snead has been unable to capture the National Open. He's won almost every other conceivable tourney offered anywhere.

And the public relations boys are drumming up "This is the year for Snead" pitch. But realistically speaking 18 holes a day is quite a chore for a 49-year-old much less the grueling 36 which will be played next Saturday.

But Sam is hot. He won the recent Tournament of Champions in Las Vegas, his own Sam Snead Festival, and last weekend won the Individual International Golf Trophy by eight strokes and led the U.S. to a successful defense of the Canada Cup at Puerto Rico.

BEFORE GOING to far, Arnold Palmer should be mentioned. Arnold's last Open last year, he won a few other tournaments. He picked up a handsome \$76,282 for his golfing feats.
