

# Stage Tornado Disaster In Birmingham Tuesday

Birmingham has been alerted of a tornado expected to strike the community at 9 a. m. Tuesday. The tornado will be a simulated disaster to test the efficiency of Birmingham's disaster procedure plan, according to police Lt. Robert Schaul.

"Our object is to create a disaster as close to actual conditions as possible," said Schaul.

**EXPECTED TO CONTINUE** until 1 p. m. the disaster will be initiated by Birmingham police who will enlist the assistance of 14 other B. O. Oakland County members of the Reciprocal Aid Agreement.

The test will involve Civil Defense, Red Cross, Fire Department, Police Department, Oakland County Sheriff's Department and the utility companies.

The simulated tornado will be staged in the Seaholm High School area bordered by Cranbrook, Midvale, Glenhurst and Lincoln streets, according to police Lt. Robert Schaul.

**BARRICADES WILL BE** set up at Seaholm to avoid an emergency hospital where Red Cross personnel will receive and treat casualties.

"The element of surprise will be the big thing," said Schaul. "Without the aid of Birmingham disaster workers will be tested on their ability to handle the situation 'right on the spot.'"

There are many other principles or criteria which could be applied to judge the measure of success of a lay curriculum study effort. However, I think I have mentioned enough to give you some ideas on the board and the feel you have will earn a good pat on the back.

**THIRD—THE** more educators study children and how they learn, the more are forced to recognize that growth is both gradual and complex and it takes time.

Many people become impatient, but the simple fact remains that no easy solutions or patterns of change emerge as panaceas for many problems. So it is in building good lay-educator relationships.

We must recognize that it takes time to develop all the possible facets of these kinds of experiences. Happily, I think that many of our teachers and administrators experienced a genuine spirit of cooperation with our lay people.

Obviously, this will assist us in a "clack of time."

**FOURTH—LAY** people bring to a curriculum study and planning experience a broad range of background experiences. Because of this, it is fundamental that a "readiness" for new stages of participation be developed by all parties to the work.

Casualties develop primarily when there is failure to discern how much background or skill must be developed before a new forward step is taken. It is no easy task to build such a readiness within a group, but a matrix which predetermines the experience of planning together.

**FIFTH—IN** cooperative work, leadership is always recognized as

# Hold Olympics Library Style

Although they sign up for such events as javelin throwing and pole vaulting, children entering the "Summer Olympics" in Baldwin Public Library's Mary J. Upton Room for boys and girls will discover it takes reading interest—rather than athletic prowess—to be a 1961 winner.

The Olympics is the theme of this summer's Reading Club program, starting June 19.

Mr. Charles Burch, of the Mary Lambie Room staff, announces that all boys and girls in the second and third grades may participate in this summer's Reading Club activities. Objective, according to Mrs. Burch, is to help them widen their book interests and develop reading ability in off-school months, by reading a total of twelve books.

## Pilgrim Buys Church Site

Pilgrim Congregational Church of Birmingham has purchased four acres of land for its future church site.

The announcement was made by James W. Isham, 1200 Harrow Circle, church moderator.

The site, located on Adams Road, a block north of Big Beaver in Bloomfield Township, will provide space for a church structure, educational facilities, and parking.

ISHAM SAID no construction date has been set.

Pilgrim's services are being held temporarily in the Birmingham Community House, but church-building plans progress, it is likely that the meeting place will be moved closer to the church site, said Isham.

Pilgrim was established early this year by a group of persons interested in maintaining traditional Congregationalism, and is affiliated with other continuing congregational churches in the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches.

## REGISTRATION NOTICE

FOR PRIMARY ELECTION TUESDAY, JULY 25, 1961

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, COUNTY OF OAKLAND STATE OF MICHIGAN

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law," I, the undersigned Clerk, will, upon any day, except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special election or primary election, receive for registration the name of any voter who may APPLY TO ME PERSONALLY for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the Thirtieth day before any regular, special or official primary election and the day of such election.

## NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT I WILL BE AT MY OFFICE Monday, June 26, 1961—Last Day

The Thirtieth day preceding said Election

As provided by Section 498, Act No. 116, Public Acts of 1954.

From 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. on said day for the purpose of receiving the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct of the TOWNSHIP, CITY or Village and in the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

## TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence duplicate registration cards, and executing in duplicate the registration affidavits before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths, and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of registration on the last day of registration prior to an election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name and designate his title, and the signature of the notary public or other officer shall be the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not on the list of registered voters in the precinct of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may, upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village, cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a request stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through his last address and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in the proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30 days next preceding any election or primary election, unless such thirty-day period expires on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the next full working day, provided that no such transfer shall precede the registration of any elector who has been on the list for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from 1 election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the TOWNSHIP, CITY or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request, the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact upon the registration record and the inspector shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk (numbered as such) and the request for transfer shall then be placed in the hands of the Township, City or Village Clerk (numbered as such) and the change to show the proper name of the street or resident house number shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk. The registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.
