## BUG BLASTERS

We cannot identify every blasted bug and disease that lands in your yard—but certain routine programs may eliminate serious damage or reduce it greatly.

ROUTINE 1—Spray once a week, covering stems, twigs and foliage with ISOTOX or McB INSECT SPRAY. Keep it up through July.

This is to kill aphids, beetles, leaf-hoppers, scale crawlers, mealy bugs, egg laying moths, etc.

DO NOT USE ON MAPLES, GOLDEN SYRINGA, FRUITS OR VEGETABLES.

ROUTINE 2—Add PHALTAN to the Isotox or McClellan-Ball spray for controlling mildew, rusts, blackspot.

P.S. SPECIFIC PROBLEMS MAY REQUIRE SPECIFIC MATERIALS.

ROUTINE 3—The lawn is definitely in need of a second feeding for summer use. Plan to use on each 1000 sq. ft. 20 lbs. of AGRICO U.F. (10-0-4), 20 lbs. of AGRINITE (7-0-0) or 30 lbs. of REGAL LAWN FOOD (5-4-0).

Keep mower at 2".  
Water deeply and infrequently.

ROUTINE 4—Side dress your flowers and vegetables with AGRICO 5-10-5 or STADLER'S 4-12-4. Watering in the lot is better than cultivating.

NOTE: DO NOT FERTILIZE TREES & SHRUBS ANYMORE. (Deciduous trees & shrubs may be nourished after the leaves fall in the fall.)

ROUTINE 5—If ISOTOX is not getting the green worms, use DD-1E at the rate of 6 teaspoonfuls to a gallon of water. Lead Arsenate also is good.

SCALE SPRAYING—The weekly spraying suggested in ROUTINE 10. I should take care of the scale crawlers. Keep in mind the plant exceptions in this routine and switch to DRY MALATHION or SEVIN.
