

\$13,000 Approved For Sewage Plant Rehabilitation Job

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night appropriated \$13,000 to pay for rehabilitation of the former sewage disposal plant. To date, \$5,000 has been spent to revise plumbing, purchase fittings, change the electrical system and install a new sewer service. The balance of the money will be needed for construction of a parking lot and to fill exterior tanks.

B'h-am-B'field Dem Clubs Host Con-Con Candidates

CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDINANCE NO. 570 AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3.3 OF ORDINANCE NO. 527 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, AND THE ZONING MAP BY ADDITION OF A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 3.3-20.

THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Section 3.3 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 527 be amended by addition of a section to be known as Section 3.3-20, said Section to read as follows:

Section 3.3-20. Property west of North Woodward and north of Willis Street described as follows:

Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and the northerly 36 feet of Lot 8 of Schback's Subdivision of Lots 40, 41, 42, and Lot 13 of Willis Addition City of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan according to the plat thereof as recorded in Liber 8 of Plats, page 8 of the Oakland County Records.

Also, Lot 10, except the East 120 feet, Lot 11, except that part of said lot described as follows:

Beginning at the Southeast corner of said Lot 11, said point also being on the West line of Woodward Avenue (100 feet wide);

thence North 30 degrees 33' 40" West a distance of 10.92 feet along the easterly line of said Lot 11 and the Westerly line of Woodward Avenue to a point;

thence South 63 degrees 11' 50" West a distance of 16.19 feet along a line 10.00 feet from and parallel to the South line of said Lot 11 to a point;

thence South 25 degrees 48' 10" East a distance of 5.00 feet to a point;

thence North 26 degrees 48' 10" West a distance of 5.40 feet to a point;

thence South 63 degrees 11' 50" West a distance of 10.00 feet along a line 10.40 feet from and parallel to said South line of Lot 11 to a point;

thence South 26 degrees 48' 10" East a distance of 5.40 feet to a point;

thence South 63 degrees 11' 50" West a distance of 50.33 feet along a line 5.00 feet from and parallel to said South line of Lot 11 to a point;

thence South 80 degrees 23' 40" East a distance of 5.01 feet to a point on said South line of Lot 11;

thence North 63 degrees 11' 50" East a distance of 119.65 feet along said South line of Lot 11 to the point of beginning of this description;

All of Lots 12, 13, 14, 15 and 19, and Lot 16 except the Northerly 40 feet thereof and except that portion of Lot 16 described as beginning at a point in the southerly line of said Lot 16 distant North 30 degrees 40' 20" West on said Lot line 60.5 feet from the most southerly corner of said Lot 16;

thence North 30 degrees 40' 20" West along said lot line 9.5 feet; thence North 63 degrees 11' 50" East parallel to the Northerly line of said Lot 16 a distance of 147.47 feet;

thence Southwesterly in a straight line 147.93 feet to point of beginning of Assessor's Plat No. 27, City of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan, according to the plat thereof as recorded in Liber 6 of Plats, page 46 of the Oakland County Records; and also the northerly 156 feet of Bates Street as vacated under Resolution No. 899 on April 17, 1961.

shall be zoned to Public Property.

Section 2. The Zoning Map attached to Ordinance No. 527 shall be deemed modified to incorporate this change.

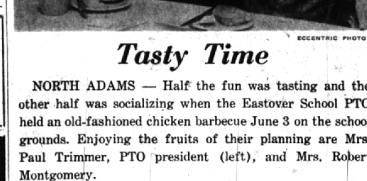
