Dr. Richard R. Galpin and Robert Maxwell have lined-up a return engagement for last year's jazz stars who filled the giant geodesic dome at the Birmingham Arts Festival.

The jazz part of this year's festival will be held June 23 and 24.

Dr. Galpin, a jazz-loving pediatrician who lives at 937 Henley, Birmingham and Maxwell, a Detroit radio and television personality who also lives in Birmingham, are to-chairman of this year's festival of the best from Downbeatdom.

FRIDAY'S concert will be called, "The Lem Winchester Memorial Night." It will be the first of the two concerts titled "Jazz in Suburbia." Winchester was still a patrolman on the Wilmington, Del., police force when he got leave to appear in the Arts Fes-tival last June.

The enthusiastic reception of Winchester's outstanding performance the vibes (electronic vibraharp) encouraged him to become a full-time pressional musician. Soon after his Birmingham appearance, he resigned his post as a patrolman.

HE WAS a young man playing his way to a jazz-world summit, touring with his own combo, when he was killed in a tragic accident early this year.

Dr. Galpin said he expected Winchester's widow to attend the memorial night. He said many of last year's top artists are making a special effort return and pay tribute to their fetmer associate.
