Gerald' Mast, an assistant professor of deawing and painting at the University of Michigan, in its college of "architecture and design" and in its extension betwice, is a graduate of the John Herron Art Institute, Indianapolis, Ind.

His degree in the date was received from the Rhode Island School of Design.
