Simulated Tornado Hits B'ham

A simulated tornado hit Midvale school area Tuesday. Ambulances carried injured students to Seaholm High School, where an emergency hospital was set up. Doctors and nurses scurried about, working over the "injured" patients.

CIVIL DEFENSE. Red Cross, Detroit Edison, Bell Telephone, Consumers Power and officials from 14 surrounding communities performed "emergency" duties. Birmingham police and fire departments and the Oakland County Sheriff's Department supervised and controlled the "disaster" area. Bandages were placed on the "injured" and blood transfusion bottles hung by their tabs in the Seaholm gym.

EVERYTHING LOOKED real. However, the tornado was a simulated disaster to test the efficiency of Birmingham's disaster procedure plan. "OUR OBJECT WAS to create a disaster as close to actual conditions as possible," said police Lt. Robert Schaele. "The experiment was a success."

edge and experience. Otis M. Dickey, superintendent, commented: "Through requirements and incentives, the program is designed as a means to offer our children and youth an increasingly higher level of instruction."

In a related move toward establishing professional salary schedules, the Board also approved teachers' salary schedules which incorporate a minimum improvement factor of \$200. Teachers with 1.84 degree and no experience will begin at \$4,800 and will progress to \$7,750 with annual increments in 11 steps plus a merit step.

The masters schedule will begin at \$5,100, with a merit maximum of \$8,250. Also added was a schedule to recognize six years of training, with a minimum starting salary of \$5,400 and a maximum of \$8,750. Very few will qualify for this schedule, according to Superintendent Dickey.

SCHEDULES OF other categories of employees were adjusted according to established ratios or related schedules.

"Although not enough money was available to meet the requests of all employees as made at the planning conference, this is a distinct step forward," Dickey stated. "While the professional schedule is still substantially lower than in a majority of the top-flight public school systems, I think the adoption of this schedule will provide us with the entering wedge for becoming somewhat competitive for the services of the outstanding teacher. In addition, this schedule will greatly increase the incentive of our present staff to update and upgrade training qualifications."

DICKEY INDICATED that the combined factors of an increase in allocated millage of 25 mills, an increase of about \$14,000,000 in state equalizing aid plus further reductions in non-salary budget items enabled the District to approach closely the original budget request submitted to the County Allocation Board in April.

The Board also approved the establishment of a capital improvement fund to provide for emergencies and contingencies not able to be anticipated in routine budgeting procedures.

IT ALSO ACCEPTED bids for repairs to the Pontonick School heating plant and for clearing the board property at 1051 Ridgedale. The latter action is a step toward expanding the Adams School site as recommended by a citizens committee in 1957.
