

Emergency Blood Drive Set for July 24 in B'ham

An emergency blood bank will be sponsored by the Birmingham Community House on Monday, July 24. Mrs. Sinclair Boynton, Newcomer donor recruiting chairman, said that blood is not collected usually in the summer months, but that there is "a great need for a greater supply in this area."

Workers who will be calling for donor pledges will meet at the Community House on Monday afternoon, June 26, when Mrs. George Weinhold and Mrs. Robert Craig from the Oakland County Red Cross will give a training program and show a movie.

The meeting will begin at 1 p.m. Mrs. Boynton may be called for information.

TO GET 150 pints of blood, over 2,000 telephone calls are necessary; therefore many women are needed for the calling committee, said Mrs. Boynton.

The Newcomer membership of 500 will be asked to contribute, and part of the master list of the Oakland County Red Cross will be used.

The goal for the July 24 collection will be 175 pints. The Newcomers Club took this responsibility for donor recruitment in 1957 and 1958. They decided to do it again this year because of the special need.

MRS. CHARLOTTE P. RICHARDS Plans Role In NEA Confab

Mrs. Charlotte P. Richards, 2490 Walnut Lake Rd., W. Bloomfield Township, Ferndale High School teacher, will take a leading part in the National Education Association's 99th annual convention in Atlantic City, N. J. The convention opens Sunday.

One of two educators representing Michigan on the 60-member NEA board of directors, Mrs. Richards will assist in amending the association's bylaws to strengthen the professional qualifications required of new applicants for membership.

Among other important matters for consideration are development of a resolution expressing the attitude of the association on the desired relationship between teachers and boards of education, formation of a new NEA foreign languages department, and combining of its National Commission for the Defense of Democracy Through Education with its Committee on Tenure and Academic Freedom.

THE NEW GROUP would be known as the National Commission on Professional Rights and Responsibilities.

More than 6,000 delegates representing over 700,000 NEA members are expected to attend the convention.

The occasion was the fourth annual Birmingham Arts Festival, which continues through Saturday.

HUNDREDS MORE flocked to the geodesic dome in Shain Park Tuesday night a crowd of about 500 literally were piped into the dome as they followed the Essex and Kent Scottish pipe band. The colorful Scotsmen from Windsor marched down Woodward avenue, then down Maple to the dome.

Parade spectators fell in behind them as they passed on their way to perform in the dome. The pipers and the Ukrainian Bandurist chorus shared the platform Tuesday, both groups receiving enthusiastic ovations from the hundreds in the audience.

DISAPPOINTINGLY a small crowd turned out to see the folk singer Odetta Saturday night in the city during the last week of the festival. Though they had to wait more than an hour Saturday for the folk artist and movie personality, her audience applauded Odetta appreciatively.

Drenching rains were blamed for the fact that less than 300 persons attended the Ukrainian Bandurist production of "Dark at the Top of the Stairs." The Livonia-Redford Theatre Guild presented the William Inge play.
