Study Habits Are Problem

The large numbers of students displaying difficulties in college study and the distressing rate of college failures indicates that a large number of students enter college without adequate grounding in effective study practices, said Dr. Lowell Eklund, Michigan State University Oakland.

Eklund, MSUO's associate dean for continuing education, said that this "works a hardship on both students and universities, and represents an almost tragic waste in the vital development of brain power for our nation."

MSUO's CONTINUING Education office has launched its first annual Study Skills Program for college-bound high school graduates of the Oakland-Macomb community.

The program will be held on the MSUO campus from Aug. 14 - Sept. 1.

Students will spend each week morning during this period concentrating on improving reading and comprehension rate, developing more efficient study habits, and building larger vocabularies.

All high school graduates of the area who intend to enroll in any college have been invited to enroll, Eklund said.

Arts Festival Review Opens Radio Series

A review of the current Birmingham Arts Festival will inaugurate a new radio program series Thursday called "Critic at Large" with Frank Gill, former Detroit Times music and drama critic.

The new series will accent artistic activity in the Detroit area each weekday evening from 8 to 8:30 over WDTM (106.7 FM).

A unique feature of "Critic at Large" will be additional broadcasts at midnight on opening nights, when Gill will present his critical evaluation of theatrical or musical performances.

OPENING NIGHT audiences, as well as those planning to attend the new play, concert, ballet or opera will thus hear an immediate appraisal on artists and performances.

Although some broadcasters, notably in New York, provide morning-after review of significant cultural events, WDTM is the first station in the country to schedule reviews on opening night itself.

Subsequent programs will present interviews and reviews from the 1961 Stratford Festival; previews and reviews of the opening performances of Carousal and Oklahoma at Northland; and summer musicals at the Vanguard Theater. The program will be sponsored by The Detroit Bank and Trust Co.

2 B'ham Residents Elected Trustees

Two Birmingham residents have been elected to the board of trustees of the Detroit Historical Society.

Loren T. Robinson, 335 N. E-ton, was elected first vice president and Gustave A. Wellman, 32335 Ingleswood, was named treasurer.

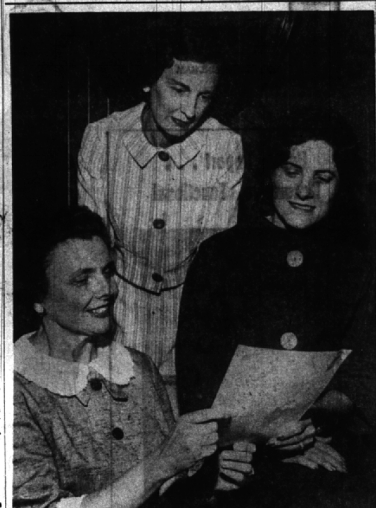

Baby Sitter Agencies Draw Writer's Praise

And call they do, the young matrons of our fair city. I was waiting in the agency's office the other day. There were three phones within arm's reach and from 8 a.m. till noon they rang continuously.

"Yes," Mrs. Smith, we'll have a baby-sitter for you at 10:30."

"Hello," Mrs. Andrews. Yes, I think we can get that nice Mrs. Norris for you tomorrow."

"I'll call her and call you right back. Thank you."

"X.Y.Z. Nursery, yes, oh, yes, Mrs. O'Brien. You want someone for three days beginning next Thursday. You're going on a little vacation and leaving the two-year-old at home. We will try, Mrs. O'Brien."

AND SO on, far into the day. Service to busy mothers is what the nursery agency's pride themselves on. They have their regular callers, and their regular sitters and helpers.

Now that vacations are starting and graduation parties are in full swing, mothers need help, and usually it's just a phone call away.

An active partner in one of the local agencies says he never knows what the request will be. There was the family who didn't want to leave their pet in an empty house, even though the neighbor next door will feed him. So—"Would the agency send someone to stay in their house to keep the doggie company?"

THEN THERE was the lady who, in an emergency, had to be away for a few hours. "Would we send someone to sit with the turkey?"

He was in the oven and needed basting every half hour.

And why do the busy young matrons call an agency rather than an individual? Well, it's much the same as calling a travel agent instead of a transportation line. They get that extra individual service, and a better selection, and the help is dependable.

While the sitters are required to observe certain rules of behavior and integrity, the client also is expected to observe some rules of

good behavior, and usually does.

THE DIRECTOR wishes everyone would observe these little niceties—

"Don't call four or five different girls at their homes who are registered with an agency, when one call to the agency will take care of you. The girls are anxious to please you but can schedule their time better if the agency calls them for you."

"Also, stick to one agency if it is satisfactory. Most nurseries are in touch with each other and the word gets around if you are not observing the rules. It's good manners to meet both the agency and the sitter on a friendly, cooperative basis. And most people do."

"MAYBE SOME day automation will bring push button child care in the form of an automatic eye and tape recordings, but at present there are telephones, and people to answer them and more people to drive to your homes, and stay with the little ones while mama is gone for a few hours."
