Library Starts Club, Special Essay Contest

FRANKLIN—Franklin's Community Library is launching a summer reading club and an essay contest for youth living in the area.

A special merit certificate will be awarded to writers of the best composition for each of the 12 grades.

Richard Barnard is the chairman of the judges. Other judges are Mrs. J. Simpson, Mrs. John Donaldson, Mrs. A. W. Bohne, Mrs. E. Loppwood, Mr. C. S. Siver, Mrs. William Kahn, Mrs. H. G. Heideman, and Mrs. C. A. Ramussen.

The composition must be no less than 50 words and no more than 150. Entries are due Aug. 16 and will be judged mainly on originality and quality of thought or expression.

Youngsters reading and reporting on a minimum of 10 books read during the period will earn a special Rocket certificate. Tax Commission To Hold Hearing

WEST BLOOMFIELD—West Bloomfield Township has been officially notified by the State Tax Commission that it will hold a hearing on the township's appeal from the Oakland County Allocation Board's 1961 millage decision.

No date for the hearing was set, however, according to Township Supervisor John Richard.

The township appealed to the tax commission several weeks ago. It asks that the commission reconsider the allocation board's allotment of 1.40 mill to the township as its share of the 15 mill property tax.

The appeal alleges that the allocation board did not give due consideration to the facts involved in the township's plea for additional operational millage. Richard said.

MID-JUNE JUMBLE
