LIBRARY BOARD members have proposed establishing contracts with neighboring communities to help pay for the services extended to their citizens. Chief concern of commissioners is that the City spend no money for capital improvements outside the city limits. Board members emphasize that they are not asking for funds for capital improvement. If the library does contract with other communities, commissioners feel, every city under contract likely would have the same right as Birmingham residents to use of the library—plus a voice in its operation.

This is a missonception, says the board. Contracts would provide for services only, and the participating communities would not be represented on the main library board.

COMMISSIONERS QUESTION whether Birmingham could legally contract with other communities without first obtaining a vote of Birmingham residents.

They insist that they want no such contracts without benefit of a vote of the people.

They feel strongly that if there is to be a contractural basis, the people in the neighboring communities should contribute on the same basis as Birmingham residents.

Other communities might not be able to start at a full mill and a half, but perhaps they could start at a mill and work up to the full amount at a given time, commissioners state.
