



Hearing Date Set On Extension of Baldwin Sewer

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night set July 17 as date for public hearing on necessity for extending the Baldwin St. sewer south 100 feet.

The connection has been requested by Walter W. Phillipian who plans to build a house on Baldwin just north of the Baldwin bridge. His triangular-shaped lot is abutted on two sides by public property and on one side by River Rouge.

IN EFFECT, commissioners denied Phillipian permission to use City property for sewer and water elements.

If he is unsuccessful in securing private easement from his neighbors, the commission may grant permission to connect to the Baldwin sewer.

Seney Noted For Wildlife And Folklore

Seney National Wildlife Refuge in Michigan's Upper Peninsula demonstrates how good conservation measures can make a silk purse of a sow's ear of nature.

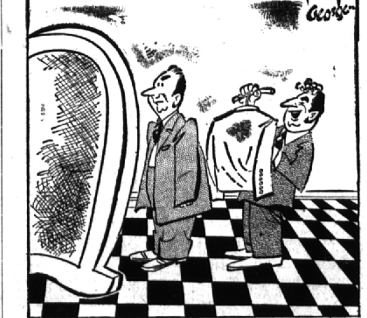
Tourists enjoy seeing Seney Swamp's thousands of acres of open water ponds which provide a home for great flocks of ducks, geese and related wildlife such as beaver, deer and muskrats, says Geographer Kenneth C. McMurry of the University of Michigan.

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service provides tour guides for the refuge area, which is readily accessible on Highway 77 north of Biens Park in Schoolcraft County.

SENEY SWAMP once was practically worthless, Prof. McMurry recalls. It was one of several great swamp areas created when the early lakes that covered the eastern part of the Upper Peninsula receded from expanses of nearly flat land sloping gently from high ranges in the north down to Lake Michigan.

Seney Swamp is named for the nearby town of Seney, a quiet village which in Michigan's lumbering heyday was one of the most notorious spots in the nation. Tales of

Con-Con Voter Registration Light

Registration for Con-Con in the Birmingham - Bloomfield Hills area has been very light according to clerks in four local municipalities.

Birmingham's City Clerk Irene Hanley, said 83 new registrations have been added since the April 8 election, bringing the city total to about 14,753. Cancellations account for a drop from the April total of 14,800 registered voters.

ACCORDING TO City Clerk Robert J. Stadler of Bloomfield Hills, total registration there is about 1608, showing a very small increase over the 1499 registered for the spring election.

Bloomfield Township figures are 12,749, a slight edge over the April registration with 16 voters registering on Monday, deadline for the Con-Con election, said Mrs. Deloris Little, township clerk.

Twenty four voters registered in West Bloomfield Township after the April 8 election, according to Township Clerk Mrs. Dorothy M. Chamberlain.

Burglars Ransack Two Apartments

Two Birmingham apartments at 450 Oak were ransacked Saturday night while the tenants were out of town.

It is undetermined whether anything was taken, according to Birmingham police.

While delivering mail, Mrs. Myron T. Patterson, owner of the four - story apartment building, found the kitchen doors of apartments 203 and 301 pried open.

APARTMENT 303 is leased by James W. Millard and apartment 301 is rented by two widowed sisters, Mrs. W. W. Campbell and Mrs. George Gledhill. All three tenants are visiting out of town.

A brogue leather briefcase containing a translator recorder is believed to have been left in Millard's apartment by the burglars. Mrs. Patterson told police the briefcase had not been in the apartment on previous mail deliveries.
