Dr. Robert Hatt To Visit Africa

Dr. Robert T. Hatt, director of the Cranbrook Institute of Science, will leave Tuesday for a three month program of research on the mammals of southern Rhodesia.

Dr. Hatt will study the habitat preferences, distribution, relative abundance, home range, food and food chains and predator-prey relationships.

Small mammals are to be trapped and marked for later trapping or observation as a continuing program to be carried on by the Atlantica Ecological Research Station of the Salisbury district of Southern Rhodesia.

RESULTS OF Dr. Hatt's studies and those to be continued by the research station will have applicability to the problems of maintenance of animal life resources over a great part of Africa.

Dr. Hatt is undertaking the study program under the sponsorship of the New York Zoological Society and the Atlantica Foundation. He is a Fellow of both organizations.
