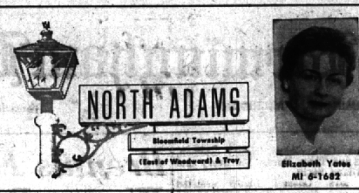
# Have You Met . . .
