4th Weekend Calls For Heavy Patrol

With the extended July Fourth weekend approaching, State Police will intensify patrol schedules to provide maximum coverage during the 102-hour holiday period.

Increased patrols will be operated from 1 p.m. June 30, to midnight July 4. Assistance will be provided by 106 National Guardsmen from 1 p.m. to 11 a.m. to serve as second men on two-man patrols and on point control.

What shifts will be lengthened from eight to 10 hours and pass days cancelled July 30, July 1 and July 4. Where available, detectives will take over desk assignments to relieve uniform officers for those patrol runs.

"HEAVIER TRAFFIC, hurry, excitement and fatigue add significantly to holiday travel hazards and chances for accidents are multiplied," Commissioner Joseph A. Childs emphasized.

"If Michigan is to hold the line on deaths and injuries, each motorist and pedestrian must faithfully obey the rules and watch out for the mistakes of others. Celebrate your holiday safely and sanely."

Last year there were 16 deaths in 16 fatal accidents during the 78-hour 4th weekend, an average of one fatality every four hours and 53 minutes.

THE LAST PREVIOUS 102-hour July 4 holiday was in 1957, while 20 were killed in 14 accidents, an average of one death every five hours and six minutes. For the seven-year period of 1953-1960 the average has been one death every three hours and 41 minutes.
