## State Police Start To Train More 'Canine Troopers'

Expansion of the experiment in the use of police dogs is under way by the Michigan State Police with the gift of four German shepherds to the State Police. The handlers is being conducted under the supervision of Sgt. Richard J. Abbott, of the training bureau at headquarters. Abbott and "Jocko", the first department-owned dog in the experimental program, were trained last year at the St. Louis, Mo., police department canine school.

"Jocko" was from a Southfield kennel.

THE DOGS ARE being trained principally in tracking criminals or lost persons and in retrieving lost articles or items of evidence. Other training will provide a better yardstick for assessing the merit of the experiment. The great deal involved in the state and the necessity for placing dogs on scent as soon as possible necessitates the close location of man-dog teams if they are to be used.

dards were being ignored by camp management.

The board voted for an investigation of possible zoning ordinance violations on the part of the one library operation. It instructed the city engineer to make an ordinance regulating standards for boat-livery campsites.

BUILDING department reports showed issuance of erection permits for seven residences, valued at \$178,500; 2 swimming pools at \$7,000 and alterations and additions totaling \$35,852.

Report on 22 runs by the fire department showed a loss of \$10,700 on property valued at \$20,000. There were five residence and one commercial fire.

Police answered 111 complaints for the month, issued 17 traffic summonses and made 158 property inspections.
