NOTICE OF DISOLUTION OF NORTH EVERGREEN SEWAGE DISPOSAL AUTHORITY
 At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees, the North Evergreen Sewage Disposal Authority held in the Council Chambers of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, on the 28th day of February, 1961, at 8:00 A.M., Eastern Standard Time.
 Present: Trustees (Troy), Gare (Birmingham), Hulet (Bloomfield Township), Breyer (Grand Hills).
 Absent: None.
 The following resolution was offered by Rehbart and seconded by Firestone:
 WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees is in receipt of resolutions adopted by each of the constituent members directing the dissolution of the North Evergreen Sewage Disposal Authority; and
 WHEREAS, pursuant to said resolutions, this Board has made distribution of all the assets and accomplished all of the matters necessary or wind up the Authority's affairs.
 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Evergreen Sewage Disposal Authority be and the same is hereby dissolved.
 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution shall be published once in the Birmingham Eccentric, a newspaper having general circulation within the territory served by the Authority. The printing costs of this resolution, certified by L. R. Gare, Secretary of the Authority, with the date and place of such publication, shall be filed with the Secretary of the State of Michigan and the Clerk of the County of Oakland, Michigan. L. R. Gare of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, is hereby designated as the person to make this resolution to be published, certified and filed as aforesaid, all of which shall be done by him within thirty days after the meeting hereinafter mentioned. In the event that L. R. Gare shall be unable to act or refuse to act, then Arno J. Hulet shall act in his stead.

Hills Woman Heads UCS Planning Unit

A Bloomfield Hills woman has been elected chairman of the North Oakland Planning Division of United Community Services. She is Mrs. Harvey B. Greene, 1040 Country Club Drive, who was elected at a Feb. 22 meeting at which planning for and the need of child guidance services were discussed.
 Mrs. Greene succeeds Charles B. Kass, 1028 Chestnut, Birmingham. Others elected are the Rev. MacKay Taylor, pastor of Northminster Presbyterian Church, as vice chairman, and Anthony B. Oiler, 2285 Garland, West Bloomfield Township, secretary.

AT THE MEETING Charles A. Mentzer, director of the planning division, summarized Michigan legislation affecting child guidance clinics. It was brought out that the Oakland Child Guidance Clinic—which is faced with the prospect of closing the Birmingham branch due to a lack of funds—has available about one-third of the services needed to meet the realistic need for such service.
 It was reported that Dr. William J. Westman, president of the clinic, and F. Robert Woollager, executive director, have asked the division to assist and to consult with them.

THE DIVISION approved aid on a consultative basis in the area of social planning of community services and guidance through community organization procedures.
 Paul N. Averill, Birmingham, expressed UCS gratitude to Kass for his leadership over the past seven years. Said Averill: "Mr. Kass was the first and only president of the division's predecessor organization, the Council on Community Services. He gave the necessary time and effort when there was no professional guidance through the period when the council became a part of the United Community Services of Metropolitan Detroit."

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LAWN FERTILIZING NEEDS — KIND — AMOUNT

1. NEEDS
 All grasses, like people, do not have the same food requirements. However, they all need food—and plenty of it.
 Do not be misled by "coverage" figures printed on the fertilizer containers or in the advertisements. These figures are influenced to a degree by the enormously competitive situation in the field, but not necessarily by the specific needs of the grasses.
 a. All grasses need some PHOSPHATE and POTASH but most of them need larger quantities of NITROGEN.
 b. In a 10-6-4 or 20-10-5 fertilizer the first figure is the percentage of actual nitrogen in the material, the second is phosphate, the third is potash.
 c. NITROGEN needs vary approximately as follows:
 FESCUE—2 to 3 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. per year
 KENTUCKY BLUE—6 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. per year
 BENT—4 to 6 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. per year
 MERION—8 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. per year
 d. PHOSPHATE & POTASH will be sufficiently supplied by using at least one application of a balanced fertilizer per year. Two or three will do no harm although there is strong support for leaving it out of the second or June application.
 e. Timing—The spring and fall applications should be made at the time the grasses wish to grow vigorously—April or earlier and early September. The second application will be most useful about June 1st to 15th. (Merion needs its 2nd & 3rd dose about June 1st and July 15th).
2. KIND
 You can take your choice—red bags, blue bags, regular type, non-burning, heavy, light-weight, chemical, natural organic, synthetic organic, combinations balanced or unbalanced, etc.
 Typical materials are:—
 AGRICO FOR TURF—10-6-4 Regular
 AGRICO U. F. GRASS FOOD—10-6-4 Non-burning
 STADLER'S LIGHT WEIGHT—20-10-5 Organic
 STADLER'S XXX—10-6-4 Regular
 The important thing here is to choose one that will be the simplest for you to handle. Consider your equipment, weight, area, kind of grass, etc., then study the following to determine, not how much you want, BUT HOW MUCH THE GRASS NEEDS.
3. AMOUNT
 Not just any amount but the PROPER amount.
 EXAMPLE:—Usual lawn of mixed grasses.
 *Requires 2 lbs of nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft.
 *Requires this amount 3 times a year
 A 10-6-4 fertilizer has 10 lbs. of nitrogen in 100 lbs. Therefore 100 lbs. covers 5000 sq. ft. (If you follow a direction that says "the contents of this bag will cover 10,000 sq. ft. you will be applying 1 lb. of nitrogen to 1,000 sq. ft. This is O.K. IF YOU PLAN TO DO IT 6 TIMES A YEAR.)
 A 22 lb. bag of 20-10-5 has 4.4 lbs. of nitrogen in it and therefore will cover 2200 sq. ft. (If you follow a direction that says "the contents of this bag will cover 5000 sq. ft. you will be applying .88 lbs. of nitrogen to 1000 sq. ft. This is O.K. IF YOU PLAN TO DO IT 7 TIMES A YEAR.)
 IF YOU DON'T UNDERSTAND THIS CALL THE STORE!
SUMMARY—
 Know something about the kind of grasses you own. Know how much food your lawn needs. Choose the type of fertilizer you like. Determine the area of lawn to be treated. Don't hesitate to call MI 4-4133 for help. Don't be careless.
 Don't skip the spring feeding simply because "The grass grows so fast anyway."
 Don't let the lawn suffer from the lack of food. It will cost much more to bring it back.
