Wonders That State Road Toll Not Higher

To the Editor:
 Having just come in contact with an extremely courteous and efficient member of the Birmingham Police Force, I feel semi-qualified to spout a few well-chosen words on the subject of Michigan driving. My complaint is not that I was apprehended driving at 36 mph in a 25 mph radar-controlled zone... although I was not on dry pavements and about to decelerate as I was approaching an intersection—driving to endanger the lives of school children, my nine-month old passenger, or myself.

MY COMPLAINT is that seldom are either local or state officers in evidence to curb some of the wild driving that takes place on Telegraph, Woodward and other through-ways... tail-gating, weaving at high speeds and without proper use of directional indicators, and exceeding the speed limit to a great extent. I wonder not that the accident rate in Michigan is so high, but that it is not higher.

IT SEEMS to me that road conditions should be a consideration in the fixing of speed limits... I have been laid out many times at a horrifying close distance and passed on slippery roads by drivers swerving on ice.

These are the drivers who succeed in adding to the death toll and who should be fined or suffer loss of license.

The accident rate in the state will never decrease until speed laws such as are in effect in Connecticut are passed and enforced.

LOTS WOULD have to be cut by a definite date. At that time, a forestry and parks department superintendent would inspect them and note their condition.
Lots found in violation would be scheduled for mowing by the City. Charge per hour would be \$6.50.
