

Teen-age Court Handles Seven Traffic Violations

Four of seven cases handled during last Thursday's Teen-age Traffic Court were speeding violations. Corrective action taken by the court of Seaboard government students consisted of suspension of driver's licenses for 10, 10 and 7 days in three of the four cases. At- tention at driver's clinic or a talk with the traffic referee accompanied each speeding penalty.

A traffic signal violation brought a three-part penalty of a 2000-word theme, talk with the referee and attendance at driver's clinic while a driving against traffic violation received a 500-word theme.

A TWO-ON-A-SCOOTER violation drew a talk with the referee. The Teen-age Court recently had its first appeal case since the court's beginning in October, 1957. A 16-year-old girl appealed the court's Feb. 9 penalty of a 1000-word theme and attendance at driver's clinic for a stop sign violation to the Oakland County Juvenile Court.

Zone Request Sent Back to Plan Board

No date will be set for con- firmation of the roll for the north- west quadrant parking lot special assessment district until the Birmingham City Commission and plan board reach a decision on a rezoning request.

Commissioners Monday night re- ferred back to the plan board a request that would affect the 400- car lot to be built north of Willis and east of Bates.

The board was instructed to meet with the property owner of Tuesday night and report back to the commission next Monday.

MYRON E. SNYDER has peti- tioned for a zoning change for his property on the west side of N. Woodward, north of the Bloomfield Art Association building.

The property, zoned R-4 multiple family residential, consists of two apartment buildings.

Snyder requested a change to B-2 retail for the southerly 70 feet of the property and B-1 non-retail for the balance.

According to Chairman Elliot Robinson, the plan board recom- mended that Snyder's request be denied and that the entire parcel be rezoned to B-1.

City Planner Herbert Herzberg explained that B-2 would create a non-conforming residential use. If the property is rezoned to retail use, it can be included in the special assessment district for the municipal parking lot. Snyder has requested its inclusion.
