

W. B'field Sewer Fund Short; To Pay Bill from General Till

WEST BLOOMFIELD—A number of important township matters were acted upon at West Bloomfield's Township Board meeting last week.

The board authorized that a deficit in the sewerage fund be made up from the general operating fund, in order to meet the 1961 payment on the Farmington Interceptor.

It adopted procedures and regulations governing issuance of class C licenses in the township, and listed two class C licenses.

A vacancy on the Planning Commission was filled.

Bids on construction of the Franklin Knolls sewer system were opened.

WITH ONLY \$49,000 in the Estimate Damage In Fire at \$15,000

WEST BLOOMFIELD—A house fire at 3297 Interlocken on Sunday at 11 p.m. caused damage estimated at about \$15,000, firemen said. Cause of the fire was unknown.

Firemen believe the fire, at the home of William Gallow, had been burning for some time as the clock in the kitchen had stopped at 7 p.m. The owners were in Florida at the time of the fire.

Cave-In Kills Son of Former Area Fireman

WEST BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—The 11-year-old son of a former township fireman was killed Sunday in a cave-in near his Costa Mesa, Calif. home while hunting for lizards with two other boys.

Lloyd Lewis, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Lewis, was under an overhanging cliff when dirt above him collapsed. Thirty men tried to reach the boy without success.

The family moved to California seven months ago from their home at 4651 Denbey Road, West Bloomfield. Lewis was working at a service station there. He told police he planned to move back here.

Mrs. Lewis was in Michigan recently attending funeral services for her brother who was killed in an automobile accident.

Arrangements are pending for service and burial in Keego Harbor. The body of the boy will be sent to the Godhardt Funeral Home.

Wood Creek to Vote On Sewer Contract

WOOD CREEK FARMS—The village council and the Wood Creek Civic association are asking the better-than-300 registered voters' approval for the village to enter into a contract with Farmington Township for capacity increase of the Farmington Interceptor sewer.

A public hearing on the matter was held in February at Eagle School. The question will appear on the March 13 ballot.

The contract provides for a connection charge of \$250 on each new house.

There is no connection charge on residences already built.

A LETTER to residents sent this week by the Civic Association states, "If it should ever be necessary to supplement the connection charge, we would be subject to an assessment on the same basis as

every one in Farmington Township."

"Township officials have assured us there are funds available from the connection charge to provide payments on the bonds for the next 20 years. If some unexpectedly there will ever be an assessment charge," the letter continues.

REASONS GIVEN for the contract are that adequate facilities for sewerage will be available, if ever needed; it would prevent a costly investment in an independent disposal plant or other methods, if required by state health authorities; possible population increases in the future may necessitate use of this facility; it is considered proof insurance against more costly methods, without cost to present home owners until a tap-in is actually made.

REGULATIONS governing issuance of class C licenses have been under study by a township board committee composed of treasurer, Mrs. Sue Warner, John Warren and

Emmett DeConick.

Upon their recommendation, the board passed a resolution adopting procedures for license applicants and board policy in the issuance of licenses.

Applicants must submit a plat including parking layout to the board. They must furnish a description of the building which will house the business. Evidence of financial and personal responsibility and business references must be furnished. They must have approval of the Planning Commission as to location of the business. A police check on applicants must be made and reported to the board.

LATHRIP—Mayor Pro Tem Elizabeth Mitchell has been reappointed chairman for the Michigan Week program and also appointed to serve on the election board for the April 3 election.

Both appointments were made at Monday's council meeting.

SOUTHFIELD—Three men, one from Southfield, were bound over Friday to Circuit Court by Municipal Judge Clarence A. Reid Jr. They will face examination Monday at 1:30 p.m. in connection with the Jan. 27 robbery at the Rivercrest Grocery, 27000 Northwestern, Southfield.

They are Norman N. Cogan, 22, of 23862 Berg Road; James McCallion, 20, of Detroit and Ernest Stocker, Jr., 33, of Farmington.

A fourth man, Ernest W. Ellis, 21, of 5312 McAllister, Southfield, was released after examination before Judge Reid.

Southfield police, who made the arrests, said the suspects were spotted March 1 at the Northland secretary of state's office by Mrs. Edmund Roberts. She and her husband were victims of the robbery.

BOARD POLICY regulating issuance of licenses provides that it is incidental to the operation of a bona fide restaurant, and application be accompanied by a \$5,000 surety bond guaranteeing opening of operation within a six-month period.

Class C licenses were issued to Frank Stratton Jr., for operation of a restaurant and bar at Northwestern and Orchard Lake Road, and Cecil Davis for Rotunda Inn on Pine Lake.

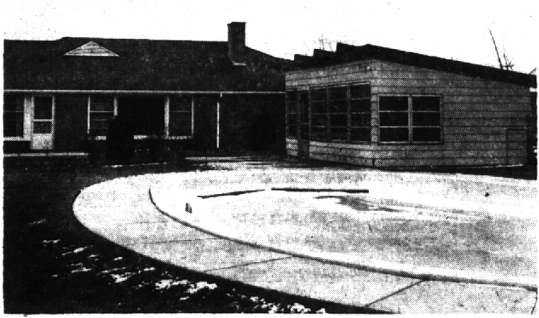
Frank Bowles was appointed to fill the unexpired portion of a term on the Planning Commission. He replaces Milton Howard, who recently resigned from the commission.
