VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 47

"AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND NO. 8 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A VIOLATION BUREAU, PROVIDING FOR PROCEDURE IN THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE, SETTING FORTH VIOLATIONS WHICH MAY BE SETTLED AT VIOLATIONS BUREAU AND PREDETERMINED PENALTIES."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordinance: Section 1.01. That Ordinance No. 8 entitled "An Ordinance to Amend No. 6 entitled "An Ordinance Establishing a Violation Bureau, Providing for Procedure in the Enforcement of This Ordinance, Setting Forth Violations Which May Be Settled at Violations Bureau and Predetermined Penalties" be and the same is hereby amended by amending Section 5 to read as follows:

"Section 5. VIOLATIONS WHICH MAY BE SETTLED AT VIOLATIONS BUREAU, PREDETERMINED PENALTIES, AND MICHIGAN UNIFORM TRAFFIC VIOLATION NOTICES. IN THE event settlement shall be made prior to the issuance of a warrant, the following violations, except as otherwise stated, may be settled at the Violation Bureau in lieu of having the violation prosecuted in court, upon payment in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, of the respective penalties set opposite such named violations for the respective offense insofar as follows:
