tierness. There were three timers for each of the six lanes. Maple Track Coach Kermit Ambrose announced that the National Anthem would be played. The audience stood up and began to sing. But the record was having its troubles. After a couple of false starts, the nearly 2,000 fans sang the anthem without music. The six competitors in the leading event, the 50-yard freestyle, stepped up to the starting blocks. Once the gun started the race, competition was as smooth as a well-oiled piston.

ALL-AMERICA Jim Elliott powered his way to a victory with a time of 22.9, one second off the state record of 22.9 which he tied in the preliminaries. Jack Hoyt of Seabolt and Harold Lloyd of Hazel Park tied for second. Elliott came back to take the 100-yard freestyle in :52.5. He and Bob Wolf who won the 100-yard backstroke with a league and school record of 1:01.2 and the 400-freestyle, were the only double winners of the meet.

Probably the most anticipated race of the evening was the 100-yard butterfly. Seabolt's sensational sophomore Don Spencer was pitted against his only conqueror, Fernalde's Larry Jacobs.

TWICE DURING the season, Jacobs defeated Spencer. In the preliminaries the Fernalde tanker set a league record of :56.9.

The two competitors were neck-to-neck for the first three laps. Then with a tremendous burst of speed Spencer forced ahead and touched the finish line ahead of his rival.

Winning time was a new league record of :56.8. The time also tied the school and pool records already held by Spencer.

In the 200-yard freestyle Mike McCarthy edged out Brooke Beare of Kinsale, to win with a time of 2:02.7. Jim Leahy pulled down a third for the Maples.

JIM BRADBURN continued his steady breaststroker while swimming to a time of 1:10.1 in the 100 his closest competitor was team mate Bob Kennedy.

The Maples swept both relay events. Larry Severy, Jim Bradburn, Don Spencer and Jim Leahy combined to set a league record of 1:40.9 in the 200-yard medley.

Jack Hoyt, Bob Nadal, John Emmett and Hugh Clark worked together for a first in the freestyle relay in 1:53.8.

SEABOLT WON 9 of the 11 events and captured six second spots.

The Birmingham powerhouse now heads for the State meet which will be in Lansing, Friday and Saturday.
