

# April 10, 11 Are Dates to Learn About Cancer Control Plans

The Michigan Cancer Foundation will launch its observance of April as National Cancer Month in the Birmingham area on April 10 and 11.

A proclamation by Mayor Florence H. Willett urges Birmingham citizens to "observe Cancer Control Month through increased support of the Michigan Cancer Foundation, and its three-fold program of cancer research, education and service."

Representatives of surrounding communities will be invited to Birmingham, delivering literature on cancer. Of these, 6,500 will be Birmingham homes. The literature, designed to encourage early detection, will answer the most common questions about the disease.

Volunteers will wear lapel tags reading "Please - No money - Thanks to United Fund." To United Fund, Crusaders will call upon residents who do not have one in home, tags will be left on doorbells.

The Cancer Foundation is looking for couples as volunteers. Men are needed to drive while wives make calls at homes.

"A lot of people want to do something about cancer - we want to give them a chance," said Mrs. A. Marriott Walker, regional chairman.

**Cole Named Torch Drive Co-chairman**  
Edward N. Cole, 1371 Kirkway, Bloomfield Hills, has been named 1961 Torch Drive co-chairman for Corporate Leadership.

The appointment was announced by General Campaign Chairman Max M. Fisher, 2773 Fairway Hills, Farmington Township.

Cole, general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors Corp. and a GM vice president, served in the 1956 Torch Drive as campaign co-chairman of chapter solicitation. Fund-raising units for which he was responsible raised \$16,098.85 of the \$18,316,714 contributed through the Torch Drive for 1961 budgets of 195 health and community services.

Fisher, board chairman of Aurora Oil Company, said that as chairman for Corporate Leadership, Cole would fill a "vital and expanding" role in the future of united fund-raising.

**COLE'S ASSIGNMENT**, Fisher said, would include, in addition to the promotion of corporate giving, the fair share schedule of giving and the chapter plan, two additional fields for development. These are a program to inform and enroll executives and business men who have recently moved into this area of the UF program.

In each of these programs, Cole will be assisted by a committee named from the community's top leadership.

"Ed Cole has done an outstanding job as a Torch Drive leader," Fisher said in announcing this appointment. "His participation as a team captain in the old Major Industries unit, as chairman of the Automotive and Suppliers Unit and as campaign co-chairman for Chapter Solicitation mark him as one of the really busy executives who can get things done."
