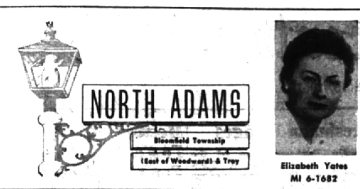


Newberg Will Get \$11,600 Yearly in Retirement Benefit

William C. Newberg of Bloomfield Hills will receive an estimated \$11,600 a year for life from the Chrysler Corp. after he reaches the normal retirement age of 65 according to a proxy statement to company stockholders.

The 50-year-old former Chrysler president's other benefits, including stock options, automatically lapsed when Newberg was ousted last June. However, retirement benefits under Chrysler's salaried employees' retirement income insurance are not forfeitable, said the statement.

The \$11,600 marks a considerable drop from last year's proxy estimate of \$15,375 which assumed continued employment for Newberg.
