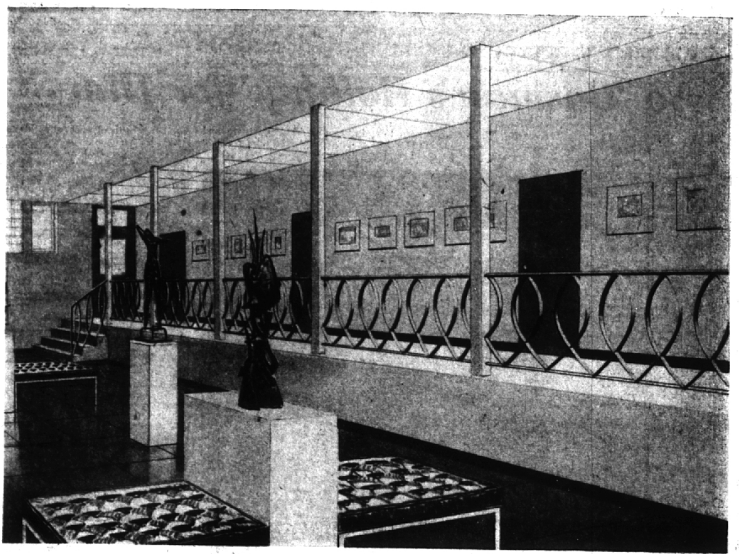


BAA's Plans for Gallery

If Bloomfield Art Association's plans materialize, this is how its gallery will appear once the Birmingham sewage treatment plant is converted into an art center. BAA has asked the City for use of the building. The south side of

the tank area of the plant, 75 by 33 feet, would be used as open gallery space. This would mean that the present 75-foot-long, 11-13-foot-deep tanks would have to be filled and covered.



Tanks to Classroom

The north side of the tank area in the sewage disposal plant would be converted into a classroom, with the erection of a wall, as depicted here. Use of folding doors would

make possible one large classroom or three or four small ones. If the City grants BAA's request, the building will be named the Birmingham Art Center.
