College students planning teaching careers are "unrealistic majors" and are ignoring public education's areas of greatest need, according to J. Hetenyi, chairman of the teacher education program at Michigan State University, East Lansing.

Philip J. Ford, assistant superintendent of schools for personnel, Pontiac, "What a Teacher Candidate Should Look for in Selecting a School System."

In spite of the critical shortage of elementary teachers, he said, as many as two-thirds of all students are preparing to teach in secondary schools.

And, of those planning to teach in secondary schools, about one-half are majoring in history and social sciences — fields that currently are over-supplied, he said.

In the secondary field, he said, the largest needs are for qualified teachers of mathematics, natural sciences, foreign languages — particularly Russian — and, to a lesser extent, English.

Russian, according to Hetenyi, is being demanded more and more by high school students but the supply of qualified teachers and persons preparing to teach the language is very small.

IN AN EFFORT to guide college students away from the pitfalls of preparation, Hetenyi called a convocation of all MSU students planning teaching careers.

The convocation, which will be held April 11, will deal directly with the opportunities and difficulties in various areas of public education and will include talks by four experts in the field.

Claim Education Is Key For Economic Growth

Determined to "do something" about Michigan's bad national publicity and loss of jobs, Republican candidates in the April election toured Michigan this week sounding a call for education to lead the way toward economic growth and new job opportunities.

"I am disturbed about the type of an education we are getting as a 'problem state,'" said Thomas B. Adams of Lathrup Village, 41-year-old head of a Detroit advertising agency and candidate for the Wayne University Board of Governors.

"We don't have to bear the title of a 'welfare state' or 'problem state'. There are many things we can do to help ourselves and take advantage of our own resources without constantly looking to Washington for help or taking charity that earns us the 'welfare state' tag.

"We can get better education for our children, make education work for all our people to develop new

jobs and train people for the new technical skills that the nation needs," Adams said.

Emphasis on research to promote new industrial enterprises and create new jobs was the theme of James C. Zeder, of Bloomfield Hills, candidate for the Regents of Michigan Board of Regents.

"This is how to move Michigan forward in the next decade," said Zeder, who is chairman of the University's Phoenix Project for atomic research and former vice president of Chrysler Corp. in charge of engineering.

HUGH H. Holloway, of Sault Ste. Marie, nominee for State Superintendent of Public Instruction, said, "With the people of Michigan paying a billion dollars a year for education from kindergarten through university, we must add the 'R' of 'responsibility' to the three R's of reading, writing and 'rithmetic.'"

Charles A. Rogers, of Dearborn, candidate for the State Board of Education, charged that Michigan is becoming known nationwide as "the watered-down wonderland of our educational system can change this," he declared. "Educa-

tion will help determine whether future generations go through life with their hands out or with their sleeves rolled up ready to go to work and build our state and nation."

Said Special Assessment Sanitary Sewer Bonds will be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 140, both inclusive, will be dated April 1, 1961, and will mature serially as follows:

- \$40,000.00 September 1st of each of the years 1962 and 1963;
- \$35,000.00 September 1, 1964;
- \$40,000.00 September 1, 1965;
- \$35,000.00 September 1st of each of the years 1966 and 1967;

Bonds numbered 116 to 155, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1965 to 1975, both inclusive, may be redeemed at the option of the Village, in direct numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after March 1, 1964, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption.

Said General Obligation Sanitary Sewer Bonds will be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 140, both inclusive, will be dated April 1, 1961, and will mature serially as follows:

- \$5,000.00 September 1st of each year from 1963 to 1966, both inclusive;
- \$10,000.00 September 1st of each year from 1967 to 1969, both inclusive;
- \$15,000.00 September 1st of each year from 1970 to 1975, both inclusive;

Bonds numbered 60 to 140, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1971 to 1975, both inclusive, may be redeemed at the option of the Village, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after September 1, 1970, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium as follows:

- \$30.00 on each bond called for redemption in the year 1970;
- \$20.00 on each bond called for redemption in the year 1971;
- \$10.00 on each bond called for redemption in the year 1972;
- \$ 5.00 on each bond called for redemption in the year 1973;

No premium shall be paid on bonds called for redemption after the year 1973.

Notice of redemption shall be given to holders of bonds to be redeemed by publication of such notice not less than thirty days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan, which carries as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest, payable on bonds called for redemption shall accrue after the date fixed for redemption provided the village has money on hand for such redemption with the paying agent.

Said bonds will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/4 of 1%. Said interest will be payable on September 1, 1961, and semi-annually thereafter on March 1st and September 1st of each year. The interest on bonds called for redemption on one bond shall be at one rate only and represented by one interest coupon. Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company to be designated on the usual purchase bid on Village. No protest for the purchase of less than all of both of the issues herein offered, or at a price less than their par value, will be considered.

The Special Assessment Sanitary Sewer Bonds are issued in anticipation of the collection of a like amount of special assessments on Special Assessment Rolls Nos. 1 to 20, inclusive, and in addition to the special assessments will include the full faith and credit of the Village for their payment. The liability of each special assessment district is limited in the manner provided in the bond authorizing resolution.

The General Obligation Sanitary Sewer Bonds are issued for the purpose of paying the cost of certain sanitary sewers, and the full faith and credit of the Village are pledged for their payment. The village will be bonded to levy taxes without limitation as to rate or amount for their payment.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$13,000.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or other depository institution in the order of the Village of Beverly Hills, must accompany each bid to guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest will be allowed on the good faith checks, and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned promptly to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Miller, Canfield, Padgett and Stone, attorneys for the Village, approving the legality of the bonds, which opinion will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds prior to the delivery thereof. There will also be used the usual closing certificates dated as of the date of delivery of and payment for the bonds, including a statement that the bid is accepted and the village has knowledge of the terms thereof, threatened pending or, in the event of a bid, that the Village shall furnish bonds ready for execution at its expense. Bonds will be delivered at such place as may be agreed upon with the purchaser.

The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.
