

Romney Challenges Con-Con Opponents

Opponents of a constitutional convention are falling in a race to excite unwarranted fears and create uninformed opposition, George Romney, chairman of the Coordinating Committee for a Constitutional Convention, charged today.

Romney, a Bloomfield Hills resident, spoke before a luncheon of combined service clubs in Lansing.

The coordinating committee heads a representative of some 20 organizations including members of both political parties, the Michigan League of Women Voters, the Michigan Junior Chamber of Commerce and Citizens For Michigan.

ROMNEY DRAMATIZED his charge by offering to give a contact car of his choice, made by any U. S. manufacturer, to the three paid special-interest lobbyists who are spearheading the opposition, if the basic statements they are making about the probable outcome of a constitutional convention should prove accurate.

"I have a proposition and a challenge to make to those who keep insisting the real issue is not the issue Joseph A. Parisi of the Michigan Township Association, Stanley Powell of the Michigan Farm

recent studies of the state's constitution as being necessary, can be effected through the amendment process within their lifetime.

"I am willing to accept the presidents of any three of our state universities or colleges as an impartial board on this point or any other."

ROMNEY SAID he had decided to make this offer "to expose the dangerously misleading character of the unfounded basic charges being made by those who are opposing a constitution, and to bring to the attention of all the people of Michigan the narrow self-interest of the organizations that are raising such spurious issues."

He listed the organizations opposed to a constitution convention as follows:

U of M Regent Hopeful Gives Talk on Education

The nation's higher education is inadequate if it does not give students the kind of knowledge which enables them to shift from one technical field to another, and to take on managerial as well as technical responsibilities, James C. Zeder, Republican candidate for regent of the University of Michigan, stated recently.

Zeder, a former Chrysler Corporation vice president, told the

Downtown Rotary Club of Detroit graduate schools, university extension courses, and industrial corporations and business should offer the specialization, but that colleges and universities must provide the broad and humane education to prepare today's student to live successfully in the world around him.

"WE MUST KEEP in mind these fundamental things," Mr. Zeder said.

"First, we should recognize the need for new ideas, new concepts, and new ways of doing things.

We must urge our educators to give their teaching techniques and programs continuing, searching, experimental, and place their faith in curriculum research and constant experimentation.

"SECOND, WE should face the fact that a torrent of new students is pushing facilities, buildings, and teaching staffs beyond tolerable limits.

The population explosion isn't something of the future; it is upon us now.

"THIRD, We should recognize that the university students is, in effect, a carefully developed product of the users of this product... and that we owe our educators a considerable amount of assistance in product planning and development."

THE TIME HAS COME

(Continued)

Although the USED SPREADERS are probably all sold by now—what? Oh! Yes they are gone!

No. 1 is the DORMANT SPRAY
 This is a most effective control for the several scales, scale insects, overwintering egg sacs of mites, red spiders, etc., if properly applied.

The materials are SCALECID (a miscible oil) and LIMB SULPHUR (an evil smelling, staining, but effective stuff).

Applications should be made to trees and shrubs in accordance with the instructions. The plants should be dormant—no new growth. Wet all surfaces from tip to base, but DO NOT DRENCH. DO NOT USE SCALECID on peach trees and be very careful when using it on magnolia, sugar maple and a few others. (Check with a good tree man.)

No. 2 is STARTING THE SEEDS AND TUBERS.
 Hardy annuals, certain slow growing perennials, begonias, etc., should be started indoors this month to obtain blooms either this year or earlier this year.

Use PERMANEST trays or greenhouses or the excellent new WESTINGHOUSE seed starter. Both have wonderful features that will give you better seedlings to plant in your garden than you can buy from professional growers.

Begonia tubers (camellia flowered, gardenia flowered, hanging type, ruffled and frilled),
 Amaranthus Annual Phlox Salvia
 Callia Lily Marigold Tithonia
 Alyssum Aster Verbena
 Lobelia Snap-dragons Nasturtiums
 Larkspur

ROSES:—Don't be in a hurry to uncover them. We have sources that indicate we are to have some plenty rough weather this month. When you do start just take off a little at a time until you are sure there won't be another hard freeze. (Don't ask us if another is coming.)

PRUNING:—An ideal time to take care of roses, trees, late blooming shrubs. Leave out the early flowering shrubs and evergreens. Don't try to be an expert. Cut out the dead stuff, crossing (rubbing) situations, weak lookers and wild shoots.

Use sharp, well designed tools such as WISS SHEARS, WISS LOPPING SHEARS, BARTLETT POLE PRUNERS & SAWS.

SPECIAL NOTES:—When pruning pussywillow, forsythia, flowering almond, cherry, plum, crabapple, etc., select some branches with buds. Dunk them in the wash tub (or bath) completely submerge for 12 hours. Place them in vases or vases in water AND BE SURE TO SPRAY or DIP the entire branch once or twice a day for the MOST IN BLOOMS.

RA-BITS:—Otherwise known as destructive buzz saws. They can and will annihilate the bean patch like a TORO LAWNMOWER, the tender shoots of all flowers and spring flowering bulbs and the luscious tender bark of new shrub shoots and young saplings of new plantings.

BEST CONTROLS ARE:

1. BLACK LEAF 40 plus DUPONTS SPREADER-STICKER (1 pint to 5 quarts of water and a few drops of S.S.)
2. RINGWOOD RABBIT REPELLENT in aerosol can. Just press the button.
3. PETER RABBIT REPELLENT—Can be sprayed on or painted on.
4. BLOOD MEAL:—Pretty good stuff to spread on the ground. Also has a bit of fertilizing ability.
5. 12" POULTRY NETTING:—Rabbits will not jump over a fence even for a Fordhook 242 lima bean.
