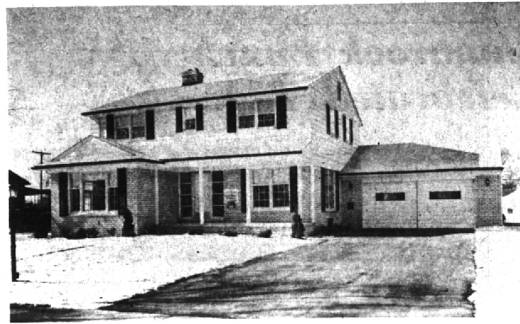
After more than eight years in Lathrup, the Richard Whittings were quite content to continue residence in the city and so confined their move from Cambridge over to Wilshire.

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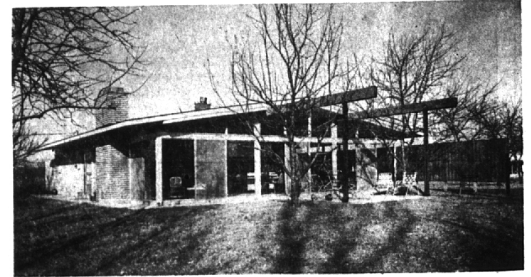
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West B'field Must Wait For Northwestern Info

WEST BLOOMFIELD — A vigorous protest to the State Highway Commission over its failure to extend Northwestern Highway past Orchard Lake Road has been registered by West Bloomfield Township Supervisor John Rehard.

In a letter to State Highway Commissioner John Mackie, Rehard claims that "meetings held years ago and data then distributed, gave the impression that the money requested... and subsequently obtained... was to be used to extend Northwestern Highway beyond Orchard Lake Road... This money is now to be used for improvements to Northwestern from Eight Mile to Telegraph and to build a highway from that point to Route 16."

REHARD FURTHER pointed out that the township has lost tax revenue from property purchased for right-of-way for the highway extension.

In answer to Rehard's question as to when the state plans to extend Northwestern across the township, he has received a letter from state planning engineer, J. D. Cruise.

Cruise replied that "when planning studies are completed or when they are sufficiently advanced that definite conclusions on all aspects of highway development in the area can be stated, you will be given definite answers to the questions posed in your letter."
