

Comm. House Offers Seven Spring Classes

Seven spring classes in Russian, bridge, ballroom dancing, a do-it-yourself workshop and exercise will be offered at the Community House, according to the Adult Education Department.

A five-week course in a home accessories workshop will begin March 27 under the direction of Mrs. Marguerite Hagan. The course will include instruction on home improvement projects and will meet from 1-3 p. m. each Monday.

FOR WOMEN WHO feel the need for conditioning and relaxation, a five-week course in exercise under the direction of Mrs. Wasja Enoch will be offered from 9:30-10:30 each Friday.

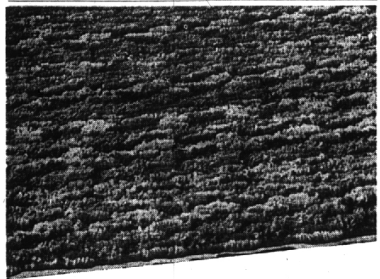
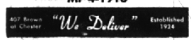

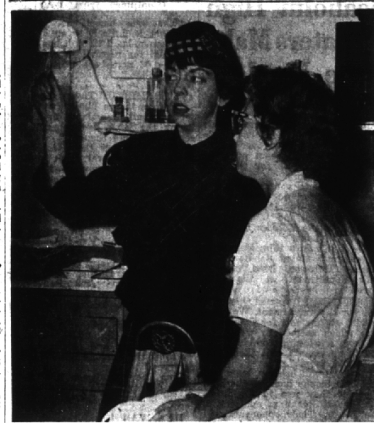
