Citizens' Group Studies Southfield School Needs

The Southfield Board of Education has formed a Citizens' Advisory Committee to study both present and future need for expansion and improvement of facilities in the Southfield Schools.

The entire appraisal of facilities is under the direction of Dr. Donald Lau and his associates of Michigan State University.

Southfield schools have a current enrollment of 7440 and face an increased enrollment estimated at 7700 for 1962 and a continually growing total until the estimated saturation is reached in 1970.

To meet this future need for facilities, the Board, through MSU experts and over 50 citizens, is studying the problem in four fields.

CITIZEN CHAIRMEN and co-chairmen have been named in four fields. These are school plant and enrollment; education program; school finance and community.

When final reports are compiled in each of the four groups, Dr. Lau and his staff will organize the citizens' recommendations for presentation to the Board.

The Board will then take the findings, scheduled for September 1961, under advisement and will take appropriate action. A preliminary report will be submitted to the Board in about 60 days.

Cost of the survey will be \$1600 with MSU absorbing the remaining 40 per cent of the cost.
